**MRS. KETURAH FARQUHARSON**

The funeral of the late Mrs. Keturah Farquharson whose death notice was announced Monday takes place this afternoon from her late residence, number 7 Prince Street at 3 o'clock to Bunbury Cemetery. The late Mrs. Farquharson was the widow of Mr. Henry Farquharson who predeceased her some years ago and shortly after the death of her son, Mr. Rogers Farquharson who died last March. She moved to one of her residences in Charlottetown, Mr. Farquharson was born at Carmarthen, Wales, March 2nd 1835 and immigrated with her parents to this Province in 1840. The late Hon. Benjamin Rogers was a brother of the deceased. There are left to mourn one daughter Miss Anna Farquharson, number 7 Prince Street and one sister Mrs. Thomas Frizell of Summerside, Mr. Geo. J. Rogers is a nephew of the deceased.

**MR. GEORGE L. GAUDIN**

The sad news of the death of Mr. George L. Gaudin, who passed away at 9.15 last evening, after exactly one week's illness of paralysis, will be learned with sincere regret by his many friends. He was a man of pleasing personality, quiet and unobtrusive, of magnificent physical proportions and a master workman, both as a carpenter and draftsman. He was fifty years of age and enjoyed good health up to the day he was stricken. He was a son of the late Philip Gaudin and served his apprenticeship as a carpenter with the firm of H. & S. Lowe, developing into an expert. He afterwards entered into a business for himself in the firm of Taylor & Gaudin. About seven years ago he received the position of foreman carpenter in the Marine Department where he discharged his duties faithfully and well. He leaves to mourn, a widow, formerly Miss Matilda Younker, of this city and one daughter; also one sister Mrs. Elliott of Port Elgin, N. B., for all of whom deep sympathy goes out in their sorrow.

**MR. C. P. FLETCHER**

The citizens of Charlottetown learned with profound sorrow last evening of the death of Mr. Charles Pope Fletcher, who passed away at the Queen Hotel at 6.15 o'clock exactly two weeks from the time that he was taken ill. Mr. Fletcher was one of Charlottetown's most highly esteemed citizens, a gentleman in every sense of the word. Deceased was born in Eldon sixty-four years ago, but spent the great part of his life in Charlottetown. Early in life he learned the printing trade in the office of his brother, Hon. J. H. Fletcher, at that time proprietor and editor of the Island Argus, and who now resides in Portland, Oregon. Mr. Fletcher who was gifted with a deep love of music, afterwards started a music store in this city which he successfully conducted for forty years. He retired from business about five years ago. Mr. Fletcher was for some years choir-master and organist in the First Methodist church and took active part in the various musical activities of the City. He married Miss Maud Douse, of Charlottetown, who predeceased him about nine years ago. He is survived by three children, Stella, married to Captain C. M. Williams, now in England; Karl P. now with

the 98th Siege Battery in France, and Lillias at home. He was a prominent member of the First Methodist church and his familiar figure will be greatly missed in the congregation. As President of the Seal River Silver Black Fox Company, he discharged his duties with ability and satisfaction. To those bereaved The Guardian joins in extending sincere sympathy in their hour of sorrow.

**1,000,000 TURKS IN THE FIELD HALL OF THEM IN THE CAUCASUS.**

LONDON, Thursday, Dec. 29.—In the course of an article on operations in the East, the Times' military correspondent says: "Out of 50 to 55 Turkish divisions still in the field there will be, beginning October 23, about 25 on the Caucasus front, 1 to 7 in Arabia, 3 to 6 in Austria and Dabudja, 1 in Syria, 3 in Mesopotamia, 3 in Persia, 2 each in the Dardanelles, Constantinople, in Smyrna, Silesia, and on the Struma front. The general situation seems that the Turkish army is engaged in the Caucasus and Armenia theatres, and the rest scattered nowhere in good strength. Only two divisions are engaged south."

**BIG MUNITION ORDERS FOR CANADA.**

(Canadian Press Despatch.) New York, Dec. 31.—British munition orders, amounting to hundreds of millions of dollars, are being placed with Canadian manufacturers, according to the New York Times, this morning, according to information obtained in banking quarters yesterday. It was learned that within the last few days an order for shells larger than the biggest contract placed in this country last year had been lodged with the Montreal Locomotive Company, Limited. An estimate on this order was between \$175,000,000 and \$200,000,000.

Steel manufacturers have known for several months that few more orders for completed shells would come to the United States, but it was not a matter of general knowledge that Canada was slated to take up a vast part of the work. News that Canada had developed facilities to make a shell business, which may amount to fully \$400,000,000 next year, was surprising to many persons of the financial district, who recalled that last year parts of the number of Canadian orders were sublet in this country. Prominent bankers expressed the opinion that Canada can get all the funds she requires to finish her contracts in the New York market.
