**Our London Letter**

In his speech the Duke referred to the absence of schools among the farmsteads in Canada, and the difficulty of obtaining a sufficient supply of teachers to give a religious and practical education to the children of those who had emigrated. In this connection he deplored the large number of foreigners from Slav and Eastern Countries who were going to Canada. "What we wanted," (urged the Duke) was English, Norwegian and Swedish people, who made the best immigrants.

**Britons First**

Curiously enough, a leading provincial paper published on the same day as that on which the Duke's speech was reported, an article emphasised the view of emigration to Canada.

"Canada needs people to develop its vast lands and partially tapped natural wealth. But Canada does not need the riffraff of Europe. It wants good stock; above all, it wants good British stock. Our best craftsmen are at present attracted to the United States, where they are always welcome. Great Britain and Canada between them will need to discover a method by which British men and women, and not Russians, Poles, and Hungarians, and not even Italians and Germans, may populate and develop the country."

Meanwhile the Canadian national Railways announces a new selection, testing and training scheme for would-be British settlers. These prospective settlers will be enabled to acquire a closer acquaintance with Canadian agriculture before they set out.

The Charlottetown Methodist District meeting was held on Wednesday and Thursday in Pownal Church, Rev. Henry Pierce, chairman, presiding. The ministerial session was held on Wednesday afternoon; after devotional exercises the roll was called and the following were found present: Revs. W. M. Ryan, H. T. Smith, Christopher Graham, Geo. W. Tilly, E. A. Westmoreland, Samuel Howard, D. D., R. M. Brodie, Henry A. Browne, was elected secretary. W. A. Thomson was recommended to be examined in superannuation and Thomas Falchors, a probationer for the Ministry was examined before the District as to his views of Christian doctrine and life. This examination proving satisfactory, and his reading course well sustained, he was recommended to be continued as a probationer, and sent to college.

Arthur G. Havelin now studying in Mt. Allison University has also passed a satisfactory examination and was recommended to be continued on probation.

The feature of the evening session was an excellent address by Rev. Dr. S. Howard on "How to make the citizenship of Canada Christian." He stressed the point of their high efficiency in the church for the great task of raising the ideals of all our citizens, that the new comer to our land will find conditions among us conducive to nobler and better life. The great task demands oneness and unity on the part of all churches. Christ, being our Leader, He is undoubtedly leading us in our great work. Having seen the vision, let us not be disobedient. The Methodist Church was the pioneer in Social Service as a definite department of church life which has now been recognized by others, and leading to a happy fellowship and co-operation in making Canada a Christian nation in fact as well as name.

The reports of the various past Mt. Allison charges were encouraging. There had been a substantial increase in membership, and in spite of the financial stringency the funds had been well sustained and increases shown. The total amount for all purposes being \$32,236.00 with a membership of 2091. There are 1287 Methodist families in the District; the number of baptisms was 4 adults and 99 infants, 34 marriages solemnized and 97 funerals attended.

**CANADIANS IN LONDON**

During the week ending 21st May, 378 visitors called at the Office out of which 237 obtained interviews and 128 registered.

The High Commissioner's Office is at present engaged on the preparation of Canadian Official Missionary News Letter No. 21 based on an article by Mr. Hugh S. Spence of the Mines Branch entitled "Canada has Valuable Talc Resources." In a day or two a statement will be sent out regarding Canada's trade during the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1924. Last week's letter contained an article by Mr. Hugh S. Spence of the Mines Branch on "Canada as a Producer of Mica." This was accompanied by a Canadian Official Mining Note giving advance information regarding the report by Dr. M. E. Wilson of the Geological Survey on "Geology and Mineral Deposits of an Area in the vicinity of Arnprior, Ontario, and Quyon, Quebec." A Bulletin has also been sent out to the Press dealing with the production of steel and rolled products in Canada during 1921 and 1922. Apart from the issue of these Bulletins a continual supply of information to the financial and trade journals of this country, and so endeavors to keep British business men fully informed as to the development of Canadian National Resources.

The Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries has notified the High Commissioner for Canada that the port of Manchester is to be opened on May 24th for the landing of Canadian Store Cattle. All the usual ports are now available for this purpose and it is to be hoped that no further outbreaks of foot and mouth disease will occur near the landing ports and that the trade in Store Cattle will be able to resume its normal course.

Captain Bernier, the Arctic explorer has reported to the High Commissioner that the alterations and repairs to the S. S. "Franklin" are now almost completed but for the moment the vessel is to be left at Leth. Captain Bernier is to return to Canada immediately to take command of the S. S. "Arctic" for her usual trip to Northern waters.

The Canadian delegates of the World Power Conference to be held this summer in London will give a luncheon at the Canadian Pavilion, Wembley on the 4th July. The following Canadian representatives will probably attend this Conference:

The Trade Commissioner Service in the United Kingdom, acting in conjunction with the Office of the High Commissioner for Canada, has distributed among Chambers of Commerce, public institutions, clubs and business firms, hundreds of copies of the pamphlet "Canada: Natural Resources and Commerce" recently published by the Natural Resources Intelligence Service, Ottawa. The receipt of a large number of complimentary letters indicates that the value of the publication for purposes of reference was greatly appreciated.

The High Commissioner's Office has received a communication from Major Fred J. Ney, drawing attention to the fact that from August 5th to 14th there will be visiting in London between three and four hundred Canadian teachers and over two hundred students from Canadian Universities.

The Colonial Office has sent to the Canadian Office detailed instructions regarding the form of procedure for the Empire Day Celebration and the Empire Thankgiving Service to take place on the 24th and 25th of May. A detachment of the North West Mounted Police will

form a Guard of Honor representing Canada at the Empire Day Celebration and will take part in the procession at the Empire Thankgiving Service. A request has also been received for a Standard Bearer to carry the Canadian Ensign and to lead the procession at the Thankgiving Service. A detachment of the North West Mounted Police will also share with the Metropolitan Mounted Police the duties of Guard of Honor to the Union Jack and Dominion standards which follow.

The Dominion Flag is now flying over the new building of the Canadian Government Offices and contractors in what will be one of the handsomest as well as the best situated buildings in London, which has moreover been acquired at a fifth of the cost of the Australian Government building.

Mr. G. W. W. Lascelles, has forwarded to the High Commissioner's Office a reproduction of a pencil drawing of Chatham House, the new home of the British Institute of International Affairs. The original drawing has been sent to Colonel R. W. Leonard, the donor of Chatham House.

The Canadian High Commissioner has received an invitation from the Chairman of the Horace Pankett Foundation to act as Chairman at one of the sessions of the conference of Agricultural Co-operation in the Empire to be held at the British Empire Exhibition on the last four days in July.

The Farmers' Club are holding a meeting on Monday 2nd of June at 4 p. m. at the Surveyors Institution, 12, Great George Street, Westminster, S. W. 1, when the subject of discussion will be "Canadian Farming with special reference to costs of production and conveyance of produce to English Ports," presented by Mr. Ernest H. Godfrey, Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa. Invitations have been received at the High Commissioner's Office for all Canadian Agriculturists who will be in London at that date.
