## NEWS REGARDING DEATH OF CORP. MCBRIDE

Mr. Joseph McBride has received the following letter containing further particulars regarding the death of his brother L. Corpl. J. McBride of the Princess Pats, who was killed in action May 13th last.

France, July 3, 1917

Mr. Joseph McBride  
Charlottetown.

Dear Mr. McBride:—

I am in receipt of your letter of June 6th regarding the death of your brother L. Corpl. J. McBride, No. 1 Co., P.P.C.L.I., killed in action May 13th. I wrote you shortly after his death but in all probability you have not received it and it may have been lost in some way. His company commander has also written to you giving you full particulars of his death and I hope you have received it.

I was away on leave when your brother was killed and he was buried by another priest near the station at Vimy. His grave is marked with the regimental cross bearing his name, number and battalion and I think it will be well looked after by the military authorities.

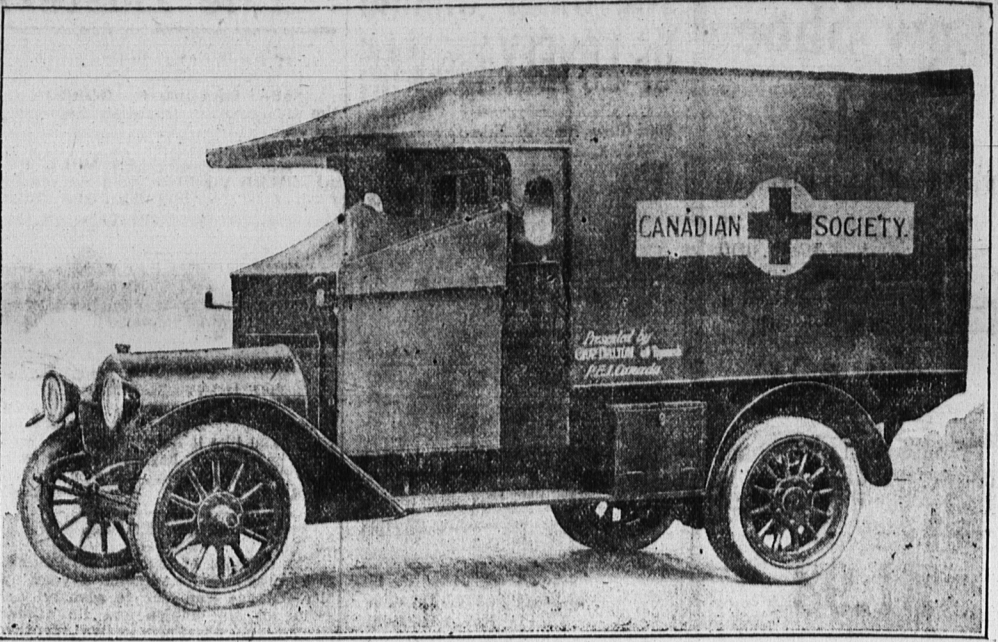
I said Mass for the battalion two days before they went into the trenches and he was killed the second day of the tour in, and your brother went to confession and communion. He was always a good boy and a good Catholic and took every advantage of going to the sacraments and Mass so you need not worry about him in the least, he gave his life for his country and his soul to God.

Regarding his personal effects or anything that he had on his person when killed, will be sent to you through the proper channels, and you should have them before now. All the personal effects are handled by a special military branch and the Chaplains have nothing to do with them.

Allow me to express to you and all his relatives and friends the sincere condolence of all ranks of the Battalion both officers and men. While you mourn over the loss of a loving brother we all share your sorrow in the loss of a kind friend, a pleasing companion and a gallant soldier.

Hoping these few lines will be of some consolation to you, I will conclude and will be willing to do anything at any time for you should the occasion arise.

## KAISER'S PROCLAMATION OFFICERS WHO TRAINED IN FOURTH REGIMENT

**COPENHAGEN.**—Emperor William today issued a proclamation to the German people in which he said they might rest assured that German blood and German zeal were not being gambled with for an empty shadow of ambition or for schemes of conquest, but in defence of a strong, free empire, in which their children might live in security. The German emperor said: "For that which has been accomplished on the front let us at home show our gratitude by tireless toil. We must still continue to fight and to furnish arms for it. But our people may rest assured that German blood and German zeal are not being gambled with for an empty shadow of ambition or schemes of conquest and subjugation, but in defence of a strong, free empire, in which our children may live in security.

"Let all our actions and all our thoughts be devoted to this fight. Let this be our solemn promise to this day, August 1, 1917.

(Signed) WILLIAM II."

**SIGNIFICANCE OF STAMPS.**

Legitimacy fails to attach to a political uprising, in the single-track mind of a stamp collector, until the nation where the revolution takes place establishes a postal system and announces the coming of a stamp issue. The philatelist regards with suspicion of the creation of an independent or of a provisional government until he learns it is planning to put forth stamps or has done so. As soon as these franking labels have appeared the stamp collector looks with favor upon the new government and is ready mentally to dignify its existence.
