

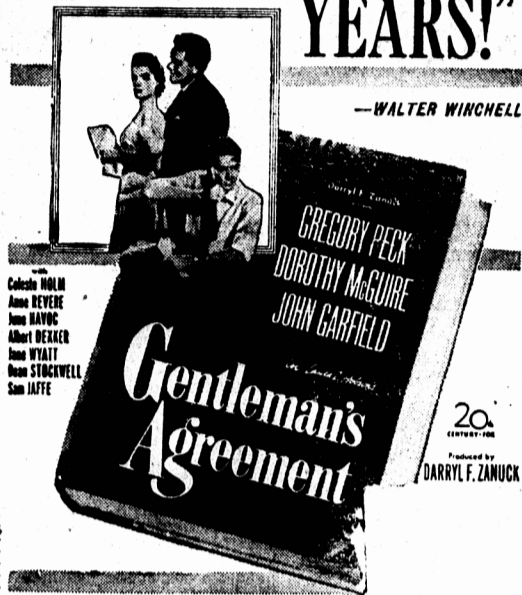

PECK, MCGUIRE, GARFIELD STARRING IN TOP-RATED HIT

Gregory Peck, Dorothy McGuire and John Garfield are the three top stars who head the cast of Darryl F. Zanuck's eagerly-awaited production of "Gentleman's Agreement," the screen version of Laura Z. Hobson's sensational best-seller, which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre.
