## ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The special with 100 passengers returned to Summerside at one this morning.

The joint political meeting last night was held at Afton Hall, West River.

After Monday next an advance of one cent a loaf on bread will take place.

The Water Commissioners will be sworn in on Monday by the Mayor, Dr. Kelly.

There was no stock market or produce market yesterday in the United States. The holiday was the anniversary of Lincoln's birth.

There was crossing both ways at the Capes yesterday and the mail reached the city at 5 o'clock. There was no movement of the winter steamers.

Work has been commenced in filling in the vacant lot at the east end of Water Street enclosed by the railway and the shore front near the gas house.

The C. M. B. A. ball at Vernon River, Thursday night, owing to the postponement was not as largely attended as it would otherwise have been. The affair was a most enjoyable one, however.

The proceeds of the tea in Zion Church on Thursday night totalled over \$200 net. Much credit is due the ladies of the congregation for their energy by which the Tea was made such a great success.

Buyers are paying the following prices:—Oats 29c to 30c; potatoes 25c, hay, \$10.50 per ton; straw, \$5.50 and pork 5c to 6c.
