SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS IN SASKATCHEWAN

EXTRA NORMAL SESSIONS BEING HELD TO MEET DEMAND

With a view to meeting the great demand for teachers in the Province of Saskatchewan, the Department of Education is arranging to hold sessions of the Provincial Normal School for the training of teachers for First and Second Class Certificates, at Regina and Saskatoon from Tuesday, August 20, 1918, until Friday, December 20. Further sessions will be held at the same points from Friday, January 3, 1919, until April 30.

To be admitted to the First Class Session, applicants from the Province of Prince Edward Island must hold at least First Class Licenses, and for the Second Class Session at least Second Class Licenses. Male applicants must be at least nineteen years of age and female applicants at least eighteen years of age.

After July 1, 1919, First and Second Class Sessions of the Normal School will be extended over a period of approximately eight months.

OTTAWA, August 8.—Hon. Dr. Beland, M. P., has \$10,000 waiting him at the capital. During his absence of four years on active service and as prisoner of war his seasonal indemnity of \$2,500 has been voted by parliament each session. NEW BRUNSWICK'S ANSWER TO SUBMARINE MENACE

ST. JOHN, Aug. 9.—Launching of two fine wooden vessels today was New Brunswick's answer to the challenge of the Hun submarine lurking off the Atlantic coast which has already destroyed the Dorntonstein, the first of the ships completed in the present renaissance of the shipbuilding art. The new vessels are the Colina K. Goldman, 477 tons, built at St. Martins and the Vincent A. White, 160 tons, launched at Alma. A second schooner is to be launched at the latter place today and at St. Martins work begins at once on a second and larger craft than the two launched today.

According to survivors of the fishing schooner Annie Perry, in port today, on their way to Boston, two submarines are working together in depredations among the fishing fleet on the Atlantic coast.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS IN SASKATCHEWAN

GOVERNMENT TEACHERS' EXCHANGE ESTABLISHED

Although many teachers in the rural schools of Saskatchewan are receiving salaries at the rate of from \$840 to \$1200 per year, according to qualification, there is at present time a very serious shortage of qualified teachers in that province, particularly in the rural districts.

With a view to enabling boards of trustees to get into communication with teachers desiring schools, the Department of Education at Regina has established a Teachers' Exchange which gives its services free of charge. By this means, teachers may obtain suitable schools without any extra expense.

The following schedule indicates in a general way the standing that will be granted to teachers from the Province of Prince Edward Island:
