CABLE LAYING

Experiences on Board the Great Eastern.

BY MR. DICKIESON,

Who Held the Position of Electrical Engineer in 1866.

THE GUARDIAN is indebted to Mr. William Dickieson, Manager of the Full Electric Co. for the following interesting account of the laying of the Atlantic Cable of 1866. Mr. Dickieson held the position of electrical engineer on board the big ship that was used to lay the cable.

When the Great Eastern left Sheerness a little village at the mouth of Thames, the shore end of the cable had not been laid. She went to Berhaven and there remained until it was put down. The whole of the directors of the Atlantic Cable with their friends were present, among whom were the Marquis of Hastings, Cap. Hamilton, Dudley, R. A., Sir Richard Cromwell, Fleetwood, Varley, J. C. Parkinson, Barber Elliott and Glass, Sir William Thompson, now Lord Kelvin, Sir Samuel Canning, C. E. Gooch, Col. De Bathe, Mr. Geo. W. Elliott, Capt. Bolton of Bolton Signal fame, Dr. Ward, medical doctor of the expedition. To wear away the time while lying in Berhaven they composed a play, each one writing his own part and setting it to the popular music of the day. The following is a synopsis of the play as lithographed in July 1866:

The frontispiece was designed by Mr. Dudley R. A. Mr. Dickieson mailed a copy of the play to his father as a souvenir. On the back is the Post Office stamp of Bantry Bay, a postal town in Beehaven on the west coast of Ireland, bearing the date of July 8, 1866 and was addressed to Mr. Thomas Dickieson, 18 Wharf Road, City Road, London, England. Mr. Dickieson was 14 days assisting in laying the Atlantic Cable, starting from Valencia, an island on the West coast of Spain, and landing at Heart's Content, Newfoundland on July 27th 1866. Mr. Dickieson left the ship in Newfoundland at the expiration of the laying of the cable but remained in

IN THE SUPREME COURT

Maritime Cases Taken up--Napanee Bank Robbers Break Jail.

OTTAWA, May 2.—(Special)—Prof. Robertson before the agriculture committee advocated the fattening of chickens for the English market and declared it was a profitable venture. Some shipments last year sold at a profit of 70 cents a pair.

MR. W. W. CLARKE has received word that it will be impossible to make the first trip of the S S. Halifax on May 6th as formerly intended, but she will sail from Boston on her first trip to Charlottetown, May 13th, arriving in this port on May 15th and sailing on return Tuesday, May 16th. The company have decided to run two steamers during the tourist season to this port. The sailings will then be from Charlottetown every Tuesday and Friday at 10 o'clock local instead of 2 p m as formerly.

The Anglo-American employ for years. After re-provisioning the Great Eastern proceeded to mid-ocean and picked up the last cable of the year 1864; then she returned to Newfoundland and successfully landed the second cable, this accomplishing one of the three greatest achievements of the century—the Suez canal, the Atlantic cable and the St. Gothard tunnel. The mountains was pierced, the ocean spanned, and the seas joined together.

The Great Eastern was then laid off until 1869 and in that year she laid another Atlantic cable from France to the Island of St. Pierre Miquelon. Afterwards the eastern cable from England to Madeira, Cape of Good Hope, Bombay, Calcutta, Australia and New Zealand. In the end she was rented to Mr. Lewis, a Jew, who used her as a holiday excursion boat. Lewis endeavored to get a licence to run a bar on board of her, but the Liverpool council would not grant one and finally the Leviathan was broken up in the Mersey, Liverpool.

The first cable tariff collected by the Anglo American was one pound sterling a word, which was collected for two years, paying the capital off in full. Since then the tolls have been reduced until today but one shilling a word is charged.

Supreme Court.

The Easter term of the Supreme Court was held yesterday in Charlottetown before the full Court.

Archd. J. McDonald vs. Ranton, Administratrix.—The evidence in this case was heard at Georgetown last February, and matters of law were afterwards argued before the Chief Justice in Chambers. A written decision was yesterday read by the Chief Justice giving Judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$298.34 and costs. J. A. Mathieson & W. E. Bentley for the plaintiff; D. A. McKinnon & W. S. Stewart for the defendant.

The application of James D. Hyndman for admission as an Attorney of the Supreme Court was received and the order granted.

Walter Matheson, Appellant, vs. John F. Whear, Respondent.—This case was an appeal from a Judgment of the County Court of Queen's County given last January against the Appellant. Evidence on appeal was yesterday taken and the full Court gave Judgment in favor of the Appellant, allowing the appeal, and setting aside the Judgment of the Court below. W. E. Bentley and J. D. Hyndman for the Appellant, F. L. Haszard for the Respondent. Court adjourned till 11 o'clock this morning.

BAR CANADIAN SHIPS.

Japanese Government Threatens Severe Retaliation.

TORONTO, May 1.—The Globe today publishes interviews from Niagara Falls, with Kato Takaaka, Japanese ambassador to the court of St James, in regard to the recent anti-Japanese legislation by British Columbia. He stated there had been talk in Japan, about meeting the obnoxious legislation, by severing all diplomatic and trade relations with Canada, and preventing Canadian vessels from entering Japanese ports, but the British and Dominion governments were now considering the matter, and from what he gathered in London, British Columbia would have to recede from its position. If this was not done some such thing as above might be suggested, and the Japanese government be impelled to adopt it as policy, but hoped and trusted the matter would be amicably settled.
