THE FIRST MISSIONARY.—In the year 1791 the Rev. James McGregor D. D. Pictou paid his first visit to P. E. Island. He was the first Presbyterian Missionary who planted his feet on the soil of this beautiful isle. He spent 3 weeks in this visit and baptized 60 children.—Truro Exc.

DEATH SATURDAY.—The death occurred at an early hour Saturday morning, of an old and esteemed citizen of Charlottetown in the person of Bernard McRory. He immigrated to this province in 1837 and has resided in Charlottetown for fifty years. He is survived by an only brother, Francis McRory, Charlotte town.

NEW SUPERINTENDENT.—Thomas Coleman of Toronto has been appointed Superintendent of the Charlottetown Light and Power Co. He was formerly connected with the English Firm of Crossley Brothers first in England, and for about eight years with their Canadian Agency in Toronto. A. E. Myles, representing that company, is at present in Charlottetown.

DR. BURKE'S VISIT.—Rev. Dr. A. Burke, of the Canadian Register, has returned to Toronto after a trip to Vancouver. He visited Archbishop McNeil, and found him very busy winding up his affairs preparatory to his departure for Toronto. He could not leave until his successor arrived but expected him shortly. Father Burke stated that Archbishop McNeil would in all probability be in Toronto by December 19. There will be an impressive public installation service at the cathedral for the new head of the See at Toronto.—Dr. Burke was formerly of Alberton.

AN APPRECIATION.—Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Armitage, Lawrencetown, have moved into the new parsonage. Rev. Dr. Hartz preached excellent Missionary sermons here and at Paradise, to large audiences, on the 24th. The result was a missionary collection double that of last year at Lawrencetown and a much larger increase over last year's at Paradise. These Missionary meetings were the first held on this circuit this year. In no part of Nova Scotia is Dr. Hartz more cordially welcomed or more appreciated than on the Lawrencetown Circuit, especially on this occasion as he gave his time and energy freely to forward the great work so near his heart.—Exc.

CACOUNA ARRIVES.—The S. S. Cacouna, of the Black Diamond Line, arrived in Charlottetown Saturday from Montreal via Summerside. After discharging her cargo she will load for St. John's, Newfoundland, Buntain, Bell & Co., the energetic and obliging agents of the Black Diamond Line here, on finding that the Cacouna would not clean up all the produce offering for St. John's, Newfoundland, wired the Dominion Coal Co., asking that they send another steamer here to load full cargo for St. John's, Nfld., direct. They received a reply advising that the S. S. Morwenna would return from St. John's, and load outward return cargo. The Morwenna should be due here about Tuesday evening of next week. This will make the fourth steamer of the Black Diamond Line that loaded full cargoes for St. John's, Nfld., this season in addition to the weekly steamers from Montreal.

WILL MEET IN LONDON.

LONDON, December 6.—Pending the assembling of the peace delegates in London, the Balkan allies are occupied in preparing a joint draft of the demands which are to be made upon Turkey and it is understood exchanging communications with a view to arriving at an agreement defining their own mutual obligations.

The formal acceptance of all the powers to send delegates to the ambassadorial conference to be held in London have not yet been received; but there is no reason to suppose there will be any delay in the assembling of the conference.
