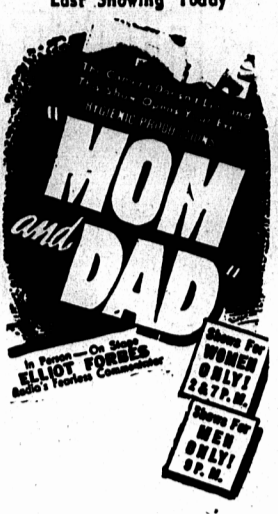

Lord's Day Alliance Meeting

The Lord's Day Alliance meeting was held under the auspices of the East Prince Ministerial Association in the Church of Christ, Summerside, on Monday evening, May 17, with Rev. J. A. MacGowan presiding.

Opening with "All Hail the Power" Rev. C. A. Hicks read the Scripture in Deuteronomy 6 and Rev. E. R. Woodside led in prayer. After singing "Jesus The Very Thought of Thee," Rev. L. G. Marshall of South Maitland, N. S., Field Secretary for the Maritimes, outlined the purpose of the meeting. It was one of ten being held in the Maritimes to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of the Lord's Day Alliance. The anthem by the Church of Christ choir was "Awake Awake, the Year of Jubilee" with Mrs. Winslow Morrison at the organ.

Rev. George G. Webber, D. D., Toronto, General Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, spoke on facing the problems of today and of the future. In his opening remarks the speaker said that the Lord's Day Alliance is the first inter-church association officially appointed by leaders of different communions. On April 20, 1888, numbers of Christians met in Ottawa to confer on vital Sunday problems in Canada. Out of this meeting the Alliance was organized. Dr. Webber said "Let us never forget the gratitude we owe to the early leaders who have carried on until now; remember we are all building today on the work of those who have passed on."

There is nothing in the law of the Alliance to compel people to go to church on Sunday but to recognize a rest day of one in seven.

In closing the speaker said that the support of the Alliance is from the free will and generous offerings of the churches across the Dominion. The hymn "Lead on O King Eternal" and the pronouncing of the benediction brought an inspiring meeting to a close.

Must Increase Cash Reserves Says Abbott

OTTAWA, May 18 - (CP) - Canada cannot be too hasty in removing its exchange and import controls or too optimistic about its ability to give further assistance to world recovery, Finance Minister Abbott said tonight.

The country's present foreign exchange reserves are \$533,000,000 after drawings of \$120,000,000 on the export-import bank loan from the United States and "certain transactions of a non-recurring character."

"Making due allowance for any abnormal factors on both the favorable and unfavorable sides, I think we have a right to be gratified with the first six months' operation of the emergency fund which we put into effect last fall,"

But Mr. Abbott said "our cash reserves must still be increased substantially before we can regard our exchange position as satisfactory."

The European recovery program would help Canada by strengthening other countries which are Canada's customers. It would also enable Canada to sell more of its exports for United States dollars.

"These are clearly great advantages but I wish to emphasize that the program will not in itself solve our exchange problem."

"It should help to assure us much larger cash markets for our exports than would otherwise be available but we must make the goods available for export by increasing production, by being sparing in the use of exports and by holding our domestic consumption in reasonable check."

OTTAWA, May 18 - (CP) - Passenger accommodation on ships leaving the United Kingdom for Canada still is considerably short of demand, acting Resources Minister MacKinnon said today in the Commons.

He told G.K. Fraser (PC - Peterborough West) the shortage of space caused the Government to decide recently to move immigrants by air.

Mr. Fraser said he had received letters from various persons complaining that they had to wait as long as four months for passage from Britain to Canada.

Chief Justice Campbell On National Group

OTTAWA, May 18 - (CP) - The External Affairs Department today announced appointment of a "national group" to nominate candidates to the International Court of Justice.

The group will function under the provisions of the statute of the International Court of Justice and has also been asked to make recommendations to the Government of candidates who might be nominated to the international law commission.

Members include Chief Justice Thane Campbell of Prince Edward Island.

Members of the International Court of Justice will be elected by the General Assembly and the Security Council of the United Nations during the third session of the assembly while members of the International Law Commission will be elected by the Assembly.

Winnipeg, May 18 - (CP) - Dead sheep, lambs, cattle and horses - trapped by the rampaging Saskatchewan River - tell the story of the flood in the Carrot River valley, 330 miles northwest of here.

Some farmers in the latest spring floods are reported to have shot their horses and other livestock when the river rose too fast to permit evacuation.

The farmers have given up hope of crops this year and are getting seasonal work at the Pas or, having settled their families there, are battling seemingly hopeless odds in the fight against the waters.

Some cattle have been moved into the town itself, but there the feed situation is precarious. Saskatchewan Government barge is salvaging haystacks from the remaining dry ridges east of the town.

LONDON - (CP) - The credit of the British Unemployment Fund increased by £38,975,650 (\$234,698,200) during 1946-47 to £454,252,868, says a government report. The 1946-47 expenditure on benefits - £28,730,188 - was nearly £16,000,000 higher than in the previous year.
