This journal does not object to the use of its news by contemporaries but when such is boldly marked "Special to The Patriot" the imposition on the reading public is too palpable to pass unnoticed.

It is about time that some definite action was taken regarding loafers in the corridors of the post-office. Not only boys and girls are allowed to congregate and block the inner entrances, but the language used by them is simply disgusting. Box holders find it necessary to wait until the crowd moves, or push through by main force, and suffer being jostled about in a most unpleasant manner.

Among the fastest of the many fast horses that have appeared on the streets on Christmas and New Year's Day was Betsey Cameron, the beautiful mare of John Cameron, Great George Street. She leaves to mourn two sons, Benjamin, merchant at Murray Harbor North, Stephen G, a clever journalist in New York, and one daughter Mrs J. Leslie Poole of Lower Montague.

The death took place Tuesday night after a short illness at the home of her brother, J. M. Campbell of this city of Miss C. Annie Campbell daughter of the late Rev. Alexander Campbell. Deceased was attacked by pneumonia a week ago last Sunday. But she was not supposed to be dangerously ill until Tuesday when she suddenly became very much worse. She was a sister of the wife of the Rev. Robert Laird of Kingston, Ontario, Robert and J. M. Campbell of this city, and Alexander Campbell of Halifax. She was warmly loved by those who knew her well, and respected by all. To the sorrowing ones The Guardian tenders its sincere sympathy.

PATRICK KEHOE, a South African veteran, died at the Victoria General Hospital last night after a week's illness of pneumonia. Deceased was secretary of the Royal British Veteran Association, and was a well known member of that organization. He saw service in the South African war, going first as a member of "H" Company. He was in the engagement of Paardeberg and Johannesburg, and other engagements under H. B. Stairs. He returned to Halifax with the First contingent, and again went to the front with the Field Hospital Corps under the command of Major G. C. Jones, and was present at the Hart's River engagement. He also served seven years in the King's Liverpool Regiment. The deceased leaves a widow and three children.—Halifax Chronicle.

A. E. CLARKE, Station Agent at Souris and his daughter Miss Pearl Clarke left last night on a visit to Toronto. Miss Clarke who has been for some time with Matthew & McLean will study shorthand and typewriting during the winter. The storm of yesterday was especially severe in the forenoon. The Stanley left Georgetown at eight o'clock yesterday morning with a cargo including 391 pigs smelts, 40 pkgs sundries, 75 carcasses beef 110 dressed hogs, 500 sheep pelts, one car empty oil casks, 3 cars mutton and one box eels. She reached Pictou at 3.15 and the Minto which had left Pictou at 9.20 returned to that port about 1.30 p. m. having met heavy ice in the straits. If the weather be favorable today both will cross to Georgetown, the Minto leaving in early morning and the Stanley as soon as loaded. The mail special came to the city last night about 8.30 and returned shortly after nine.
