Climb Of Stock Market Prices Eased Yesterday

NEW YORK, Oct. 21—(AP)—A climbing stock market took a rest today after getting within shooting distance of the highest average since mid-July.

Steels made sporadic efforts to get ahead but without much luck. Bethlehem reached a new high for the year at one time but closed a trifle lower.

Airline issues again attracted buying interest, along with railway and utility stock. Sales of 1,200,000 shares were the largest since the end of September and compared with 1,180,000 Wednesday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks remained at 69.8. The industrial component declined while the rail and utility sections advanced.

At Montreal
MONTREAL, Oct. 21—(CP)—Trading was moderate in both selected industrials and mines throughout today's session on the Montreal Stock Exchange and Curb market. Stocks continued uphill in a narrow range.

Mines followed the general upswing in a quiet list. United Asbestos was again most active issue, selling 105,500 issues, nearly half of the total mining turnover.

Closing averages indicated banks off .01 at 26.62; utilities up .1 at 74.6; industrials up .5 at 135.5; papers off .06 at 354.26 and golds off .53 at 59.74.

Industrial sales were approximately \$1,500 million, an increase of \$100 million over yesterday's total. Mining turnover was 213,800 shares, compared with 229,300 shares in the preceding session.

At Toronto
TORONTO, Oct. 21—(CP)—Base metals moved ahead for the fourth successive day of gains on the Toronto Stock Exchange today, although action slackened slightly and some selling cut into strong early gains.

Western oils followed close behind, chalking up some good advances as Home Oil took the spotlight. Golds also added gains.

The base metals index continued to rise, establishing another new high for the year.

At London
LONDON, Oct. 21—(Reuters)—It was a quiet day in the London Stock Exchange with few major price alterations.

British Government stocks remained steady apart from an occasional small loss. The subscription list for the new £100,000,000 electricity three-per-cent loan opened and closed today.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 21—(CP)—Allocation to the United Kingdom of 1,000,000 bushels of wheat under the Canadian agreement in the last two days was reported on Winnipeg Grain Exchange today.

Offerings in barley were more liberal, with a slight increase in hedging. As a result support thinned out in the closing stages and moderate declines were reported.

Oats came in for aggressive buying by shippers, exporters and American houses, and offerings were well absorbed. Rye trading was mostly of a commission house nature, with the occasional outside order.

Prices of class two wheat were unchanged from yesterday.

Egg And Poultry Market Report

Egg receipts throughout the Province are showing a gradual decline, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, supervising poultry products inspector. Quality is now considered only fair. Retail demand is steady with a tendency toward Grade B eggs which are at present scarce. Demand from other Maritime points is heavy and small shipments continue to move daily.

Grading stations are queuing for ungraded eggs: AL 61 1/2, AM 55 1/2, A Pullet 36, B 39, C 26, and for the graded pack: AL 66 1/2, AM 63 1/2, AP 41, B 44, C 31.

Dealers are quoting retailers for the graded cartoned pack: AL 72, AM 70, AP 46. B loose 50, C loose 36.

N.Z. May Get Power From "Hot Springs"

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Oct. 20—New Zealand is studying the possibility of producing electricity from the vast number of underground "hot springs" that exist in this country.

In many parts of New Zealand these subterranean thermal pools provide potential sources of power on a large scale, but now are almost wholly neglected.

The Maoris in some parts of the North Island cook their food in hot pools near their houses and in Rotorua, the largest thermal area, bores have been put down from some houses to secure boiling water for a constant free central heating supply. Apart from this the geysers, steam blow-holes and other thermal activity found in many parts of the North Island and some parts of the South Island have been regarded purely as tourist attractions.

The great recent increase in the demand for electricity, however, has obliged authorities to seek new sources of supply. New Zealand does not produce coal to

maintain large coal-burning plants.

Serious Shortage
The South Island has almost unlimited hydro-electric resources but the North Island is less favorably placed. Main development in the North is the construction of a series of hydro-electric plants along the largest river, the Waikato. Two have been completed and a third is well under way. Eventually the river will have a chain of 10 dams and power stations but construction has been unable to keep up with the increasing demand and already there is a serious power shortage.

To study means of supplementing the supply from thermal sources, New Zealand officials have been inspecting the power works at Lardarello, in Italy where in a thermal area considerably smaller than Rotorua as much power is generated from thermal activity as the entire Waikato River project will produce when completed. A number of technical problems will have to be overcome before the Italian method can be applied to New Zealand. Different chemicals are present with the steam in some cases. However, there are prospects of New Zealand's thermal areas providing a cheap and abundant power supply in the future.
