IMMIGRATION BILL NOW FOR SENATE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The conference report on the immigration bill was again accepted to-day by the house. It was the third time that the measure had been taken up in the house, because of the senate's insistence on further conferences. It finally was adopted after a short debate, during which the bill was characterized by some as un-American, unpatriotic, vicious and unnecessary, and warmly defended by others. It now goes to the senate.

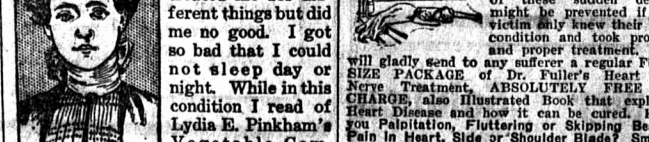

IN MEMORIAM.

On January the 23rd there passed peacefully away at his home at Gurnsey Cove one of the oldest and most respected in the residents of this community in the person of Edward J. Jordan in his 84th year. The deceased was born at Monmouthshire, England, in the year 1829. Although he had been a sufferer from neuralgia for a number of years his condition was not considered worse than usual and his death was sudden and unexpected even to his most intimate friends. At the age of twenty the late Mr. Jordan with his parents immigrated to this Province, landing at Malpeque in the month of August and residing at Winsloe for one year when he moved to Gurnsey Cove, where he was married in the year 1856 to Miss Ruhamey Sencabaugh who survives him with their family of six sons and three daughters, all of whom reside in this Province, with the exception of Dr. Edward F. of the South Falls Collier, South Dakota, and Mrs. L. O. Fraser, Solon, Alberta. Three children predeceased him. He also resided for a time at Murray River and High Bank at each place being instrumental in building a place of worship. When but ten years of age he signed the temperance pledge at the Band of Hope, which pledge he kept till the hour of his death. All his life he was an earnest temperance worker and an ardent advocate of prohibition, refusing to be a supporter of any candidate who would not support the measure. In his labors for temperance he had the sympathetic and valuable assistance of his wife who joined him in every praiseworthy undertaking. Their hospitable home became the home of all who labored and consulted with them in every good cause and the kindly hospitality of both was one of the strong factors in the success of their undertakings. He was a member of the Baptist Church and took an active interest in every Christian work. The large concourse of people from all parts of the surrounding country that assembled on Jan. 25th to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed by attending his funeral, which was held from the church on the Beach Pt. Cemetery, showed the high esteem in which he was held by all.

RECIPES.

Apple Slump.—One quart apples, one cup flour, one-half cup milk, one cup baking powder, one quarter teaspoon salt, one-quarter cup sugar.
 Wash, pare and core the apples, put into saucepan which has a close fitting lid with one cup water. Boil 10 minutes. Sprinkle the sugar over and cover with the dough. Put on the lid and boil 20 minutes without lifting the lid. Serve with sugar and milk. Dust with cinnamon if you like.
 Shepherd's Pie.—To meat add one-half cup finely chopped onion, one teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, boil one hour; mix one tablespoon flour with a little cold water, add and boil three minutes.

and boil three minutes.

Boil and mash one quart white potatoes, dust with one tablespoon flour, one teaspoon salt and mix well.
 Brush cake dish, six inches in diameter, with a little drippings, cover the bottom with the mashed potatoes, one inch deep; then put in the stewed lamb, sprinkle with one tablespoon chopped parsley, cover the top with the rest of mashed potatoes, rough with fork and place in hot oven 20 minutes or until brown.
 Mutton Broth.—Put one and one-half pounds mutton on with two quarts boiling water, a small onion, a small carrot and boil one hour. Then remove four cups of stock; then strain the stock through cheesecloth. Season with salt, pepper, paprika and one tablespoon chopped parsley. To strain the stock and not have the fat in the soup, place a strainer over saucepan, wring a piece of cheesecloth out of cold water and line the strainer with it. Slowly pour the stock through so the fat will cling to the old wet cheesecloth.
