The Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Chief Justice, presided at the opening of the June Term of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday. Mr. Justice A. C. Saunders was also present on the bench.

Two criminal cases which had been set down for trial at this sitting after the jury had disagreed at a previous sitting, were set over to the November term. These were the King vs. John Sutherland MacKay, manslaughter, and the King vs. William Moses Arsenault, perjury.

In addressing the Grand Jury Chief Justice Campbell referred to the severance of his cordial business and political relations with the people of Prince County. He expressed hope that the presentation of the Grand Jury in their report also congratulated his Lordship.
