Graduation Exercises At Prince County Hospital Yesterday

At the graduation exercises of the Prince County Hospital held last night in the Summerside High School auditorium, five student nurses received their pins and diplomas from the superintendent, Mrs. Margaret Boehner. The five who graduated were: Marguerite Helen McCarville, Kinkora, Kathleen Jean Campbell, Montague, Eileen Jenkins, Summerside, Jean Isabelle Johnston, Suffolk, Zella MacDonald, Ellerslie. The exercises were presided over by Mr. W. E. Warby, chairman of the Board of Trustees, who in addressing the audience extended first his congratulations to the graduates on the completion of their course and wished them every success.

Dr. Darby said that the Prince County Hospital was fortunate indeed in securing the services of the present Superintendent, Mrs. Boehner, and to her and to the fine staff of nurses under her he gave credit for the present smooth working conditions which prevail there and the cordial relations which exist between the staff and the Board of Directors.

The financial condition of the hospital has improved during the past year and there was a general improvement in the interior decoration of the entire institution. He stated that during the year ending in 1946 there had been twenty four hundred admissions as compared to twenty two hundred in 1947. 616 babies had been born this year which was an increase of 72 over last year.

New Hospital Plans Mr. Darby then went on to deal with the matter of the new hospital on which work had begun and was later stopped for the time being. He said that many have been wondering why this condition existed and the work had not proceeded. The amount received, he said, from the public subscription campaign and the grant from the Town of Summerside amounted to \$300,000. Plans and specifications were drawn up which showed an estimated cost of \$700,000 for the new hospital and the directors planned on borrowing \$500,000 by way of bond issue. Mr. Darby stated that later figures submitted showed the cost would be several thousand dollars more than the original estimate and while the directors had eased their cost on figures which they had every reason to consider as reliable, under the circumstances, they did the only possible thing, they stopped the work.

Mr. Darby went on to say "we will have to revise our plans to do without some things, things of course which would not impair the general efficiency of the new hospital." He further explained that the additional required credit which will be sought will be by trustees investment bonds and in order to place the bonds in this category it was necessary to wait until Parliament had passed the necessary legislation to put this in effect. When all this had been ironed out and satisfactory arrangements made with the bonding companies he said he believed that an institution would arise of which the people of Prince County might well be proud.

In summing up his report he stated that he did not think the people of Prince County had given their full support to the campaign and that they really supported the
