THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching yesterday on the subject of "Christian Marriage," the Minister, the Rev. D. H. B. Somers, said: "Of course I am well acquainted with the contemporary mood of so-called 'broadmindedness' which justifies and even encourages a little 'playing around.' Our social life is sufficiently free to permit acquaintance, familiarity, and even intimacy outside of marriage. Another man or woman is found to be attractive. The two meet—at first seldom, then frequently. They exchange confidences. Neither of them intended to hurt or be untrue to his permanent partner. But before either one knows it the two of them have been swept to words and deeds neither contemplated. Respect the conventions. Respect the conventions of language, of loyalty in speech. Words make love dangerous. An attraction however strong, is easily controlled until it has been put into language. When the word has been spoken a new power has been created. How often the story has been repeated: 'The impulse is man or woman confesses to the new companion how little human sympathy he or she gets at home. Of course, every man or woman can thus pity himself. There is a sense in which every wife is neglected. And there is a sense in which every husband is mismanaged.'"

If you have been guilty of encouraging these confidences from your friends, male or female, the Lord of Heaven forgive you. A capacity for self-pity, a belittling of the love already possessed, an assumption that we do not love and are not understood is standard tactics in the warfare of the sexes. It is the time-worn strategy by which we seek to gain the sympathy and good graces of another. There is a convention of loyalty of speech which protects marriage. Your wife is your wife; your husband is your husband. Never belittle the dignity of that relationship in talking with any other man or woman.

portance insofar as life was concerned. The fact that only 15 of the 800 cases of gland cancer were found living after five years may not appear encouraging, but this does not mean that more could have been kept alive had the exact location of the gland cancer been discovered and treated earlier.

It is concluded that locating the cancerous lymph gland is a most important factor in suggesting a favorable prognosis or outcome. Apparent cure in such cases can be obtained by irradiation or surgical removal. The destruction of the cancer is complete. It is wise to use the greatest amount of radiation which the tissue can safely withstand.

Of course if the cancerous gland is "inside" the body it may be difficult to discover it, but if on the outside of the body as under arm, back of neck, in the groin or elsewhere on the outside of body, early treatment by X-ray, radium or surgery means a better chance of cure.

But there was the sawing as well—the lumber and shingles; the grain-crushing too and in season the making of oat meal and the farming of many acres besides. And back of it all, quietly and unobtrusively but gifted with the clearest executive ability was "Mr. S. The Miller." He was the sort of miller one finds in the storied past. Of short stature broad and "powerfully strong."

Quiet even retiring by nature and yet genial and merry to those who knew him best.

Patient, never lifting his voice in anger; apparently leisurely in his moving and yet one of those who makes no needless steps; kind, enjoying especially the company of children. One who lived at peace with family and neighbors. Punctual in his outgoings and incomings. Time was when he dwelt beside us, before retiring to the farm out on the road, we used to say "there's no need of a clock on market days." We could tell the time almost precisely by his going to and returning from town with flour and others of the mill products. We spoke of it tonight as we walked towards home from waking The Miller, for ours, is a community as are I suspect most rural Island ones, which continues this old custom. Towards the farmhouse, many from the district and further wended quiet ways this evening — came from their fields or the late choring to stay awhile with those who mourned a good parent's passing — to recall many a cheery word or smile from the one who lay at rest in the stillness of the parlor. Jock was with us. Chatting quietly, we came down along the slope in the starlight, treading in the very steps the departed had often taken in the years now gone. The moon was topping the opposite side of the valley lighting up the daisy-clad meadows. We came by the mill door and along the dam, where the escaping water played a soft requiem in memory of the one who had often faithfully kept watch over it in time of flood—no fresher flow this but calmly it went like the soul of one who fearing nothing "out yonder" leaves its house of clay to be borne gently beyond our mortal ken.
