Notes by the Way

The new mining camp at Red Lake Northern Ontario is attracting a swift rush to the spot from all parts of that province and far beyond its bounds. The nearest railway station, Hudson, on the Canadian National, is 140 miles distant from the mines. Reports tell that the quartz rock in which the precious gold is embedded is surpassingly rich and the rush of eager wealth seekers to get there and locate claims is creating great excitement. Men who have mined in California, Australia and the Transvaal are among the travelers northward some of them wealthy and a host of others who are as yet only dreaming of wealth to come.

Aeroplanes are already carrying mails and passengers to the new encampment, while the mob are tramping on foot over rough and drifted snowroads and carrying heavy loads of mining implements and foodstuffs on their backs.

It is impossible at present to transport the heavy machinery necessary to mine and crush the rich quartz and extract its treasures but wild predictions are made as to the weekly output next summer. When the three Maritime governments present their claims for compensation for their share of the natural resources transferred to the larger Mainland Provinces from the public domain, they will not, of course forget that the gold, silver and copper which Ontario acquired as a free gift some years ago are a far richer possession than the coal of Alberta. The claim for compensation is rock-based in right and justice and the time is ripe for its settlement.

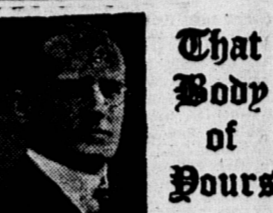
The Washington Government is firm in the belief that farmers need protection for the products of their fields, their stock yards and their dairies and creameries.

Believing so they jacked up the duties on wheat from 25 cents to 42 cents a bushel one or two years ago, with a proportionate raise on meats, poultry, and eggs. Now, alleging as a reason that Danish butter was coming into the States, they have raised the duty on butter from eight cents per pound as it was, to twelve cents per pound. And what has the King Government been doing to protect Canadian farmers and dairymen in the meantime?

This is what they have done—made a treaty with Australia to admit butter from that country at one cent per pound, and subsequently made a like agreement with New Zealand! This would be incredible if it were not so painfully true as it is. The 4 cents per pound, which was the duty before against all butter exporting countries afforded some small protection to the Canadian farmer has thus been practically swept away and our market thrown open to the people of the antipodes.

Why should the United States, Australia, New Zealand, or any other country be given an advantage in our home market that is refused us in theirs? But such are the conditions we are up against in Canada just now. The two co-operating parties at Ottawa, Liberals and Progressives, have so decreed it and we must submit. Meanwhile Washington threatens still higher duties on cream and milk.

Is it fair, just, reasonable or right? We do not think so. Nor do we think that it contributes to the prosperity, contentment, or progress of the farmers of Canada. Rather do we think that these conditions are the fruitful cause of discontent, of loss, of alienation to thousands of native born Canadians in the country districts throughout Canada.

That Body of Yours

THE CAUSE OF ASTHMA. You meet folks every day that are unable to eat such a wholesome food as eggs. In one the eggs cause great distress in stomach and intestines, in another there will be a rash like hives come out on the skin, in others an itching of the skin and redness approaching eczema, and in still another a tightness across the chest, asthma.

A. Johns Hopkins physician in discussing the causation of asthma tells us that the extreme sensitiveness in some people to the pollen of plants, dander from horses, certain drugs and foods, is due in every case to the same underlying condition in all these cases, no matter which one of the above causes the trouble. He is of the opinion that while food or drugs causes some trouble taken by mouth, asthma is most likely to come by way of the nose or throat.

Some form of what is known as protein matter, same substance as found in meat, eggs, and cereals, is thought to be responsible in nearly half the cases. This has been proven by "skin tests" in asthmatic folks. A protid or protein substance is placed on a small scratch in the skin, as with vaccine for small pox. Within half an hour or less a red swelling, something like the swellings from hives, appears at the site of the test. This is more than one-fifth of an inch in size, it is thought to be a "positive" sign that the asthma is due to the fact that the tissues in that particular person are affected by some protein, in the form of or from protein, that is meat, eggs, wheat, rice, corn, milk, fish, chicken, lobster and some fruits, peaches, strawberries, or apples. Perhaps from dander from horse, dog or cat. Also from pollen of certain plants, like ragweed.

this Government. I refer to the late Hon. A. F. Prowse, which demonstrates to us the brevity of life, and in everything stood for the highest and noblest; whose character and influence will long be felt throughout the whole Province.

The passing of Mr. Prowse necessitated a bye-election in the Murray Harbour district, the result of which was the election of our friend Mr. Norman McLeod to this Government. Right here allow me to congratulate Mr. McLeod who so successfully carried the Conservative banner to victory on the 14th day of January last. Also the other two members, Mr. H. F. McPhee who was elected to the honourable position of Minister of Public Works for this Province, and Mr. G. D. Pope of the Summerside district who was returned with such a handsome majority to the winning another seat for the Liberal Conservative party.

The question of transportation arrangements together with freight rates in the Maritime Provinces has been extensively dealt with by the mover in the reply to the speech from the Throne, and I wish to heartily corroborate his statements and emphasize the need of greater pressure being brought to bear by this Government on the powers that be for better conditions in our railway facilities in the Maritime Provinces.

We, as a Government, must continue to promote that which makes our Province a better place to live in—this last year great advancement has been made along the lines of agriculture and economic conditions—bringing before the people various improved methods in agriculture which has made Prince Edward Island rank second to no other with any Province in the Dominion. Mr. Speaker may I ask the indulgence of the House for a few moments to review briefly the progress in national activities throughout the Dominion for the past twenty five years. The population of 1901 was 5,371,315 and today approximately 9,000,000 an increase of over 67 per cent. In the first year of this century the value of the output of manufactures was recorded by the Census office as being \$481,053,357 and I find from reliable sources that the value of the output of product for 1925 is \$1,250,000,000 or an increase of 42 per cent. The value of the mineral products for 1901 was less than \$65,000,000 and in 1925 that product was over \$225,000,000. It is however, to agriculture that we have to look for the greatest advance in productive effort. At the outset of this century in 1901 the value of the year's production was \$195,000,000 and in 1925 it was estimated that the production was over \$1,150,000,000. Our fields, manufactures, and mines with their steadily increasing output have caused our foreign trade to extend to such an extent as to make Canada one of the leading trade nations in the world. In the year 1901 the total foreign trade amounted to \$355,132,000 whereas for the twelve months ending September last it was \$2,181,919,380 an increase of over 466 per cent. Within the present quarter of the current year the savings deposits of our banks have increased from a yearly average of \$222,000,000 to one of \$1,260,000,000 or over 470 per cent. Our assets of our banks in the same period had grown from \$532,000,000 to \$2,720,000,000 or over 412 per cent. Increase while some of our individual banks today have under administration a larger volume of assets than all the banks in Canada had when this century opened.

Little wonder now that you are a country of vast treasure and resources and you are only at the threshold of its greatness—You produce some of the best wheat in the world; you raise fine cattle, but the world knows today that above everything you produce a gallant race of men. Returning to our own Province we are brought face to face with the deplorable fact that our population has decreased from one hundred and thirty thousand in 1901 to about eighty eight thousand. Owing to this condition of things our local taxes are becoming fast an unbearable burden. "We believe that you are entitled to a better government."

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

During this past two years 322 steel and concrete culverts and bridges were built. The first cost of this work is heavy, but is always a saving to the Province in the long run, as the upkeep is very light after they are once installed. Quite a number of large steel span bridges were also built. The storm of October 1923 was reflected in the work of 1924 and made the expense greater than usual, and in that year \$32,000 was expended on bridges in ordinary expenses apart from the extra caused by the storm. Travelling the roads where traffic is extra heavy is a step in the right direction if followed up each year as finance permits. The Patrol system is in the experimental stages and remains to be seen whether or not it will be continued in the same way as last year, but the permanent highway system must be kept up and the continuation of this kind of work is the only way to make it lasting. While we had an unusually bad fall last year owing to the heavy rains commencing early in the season the roads were fairly passable so that the farmers were able to continue hauling their seed potatoes in the fall—which was made possible at least in part due to the patrol system. The three power machines during the first year made a very excellent showing, and I believe will eventually become the only way of building our dirt roads as it can be done when most needed and with greater speed and efficiency. In conclusion Mr. Speaker, it may be remarked that our Province has enjoyed a year of great prosperity in every branch of industry and enterprise. I have great pleasure in recording the motion of the Hon. Member for Summerside. The Leader of the Opposition followed with a lengthy speech and was still speaking when the House rose at 5:15 o'clock to meet today (Thursday) at 3 o'clock.

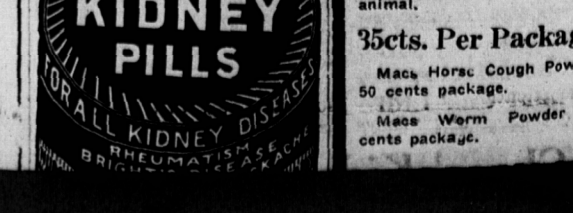
