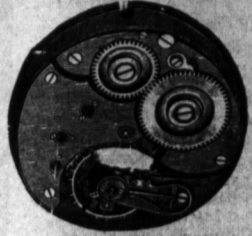

The funeral of the late D. Robert M. Hooper, Milton, will take place Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The meeting of officers of the 4th Regt. C.A. called for tomorrow evening, is postponed until Friday evening next 22nd Feby.

The death took place at Eidon, February 10, of Lila W. McLeod, only daughter of Norman R. McLeod, aged 24 years. She leaves a father and one brother to mourn their loss.

CAPT. E. H. COOK, Marconi operator at Cape Bear, has sent in his resignation from that station, and will leave there this morning. He will be succeeded by F. E. Burroughs, formerly operator at Cape Sable.

It is expected that a large number will come from Summerside to skate in the big Arena tomorrow night. The Fourth Regiment Band will be in attendance. The prices for Charlottetown skaters will be the same as on other band nights.

The death occurred at Hopfield, February 11, after a long illness, of Sarah C. beloved wife of Angus W. Smith in the 36th year of her age, leaving a husband and one son. She was the eldest daughter of Duncan McNeill, Little Sands, who with one sister and brother survive.

On Feb. 11th, at Halifax infirmity the death occurred of the brain after an illness of seven weeks, of James Smith Layton B.A., M.D., eldest son of Rev. Jacob and Maggie Layton, age 31 years. The late James Layton, was the eldest son of Rev. John Layton for some years stationed at Marshfield, in this Province.

The re-union of the Prince Edward Island Benevolent Association, on Feb. 18, in Boston was the largest and most successful affair in the history of the Association, and great credit is due the officers and committee of arrangements, for making the re-union a social and financial success. A large sum was realized for the Sick Benefit Fund. From eight until nine the early arrivals were entertained by a splendid concert program by the full orchestra, and shortly after nine the grand march was started, led by President Daniel J. McLean, accompanied by his sister, Miss Carrie McLean, followed by Vice President Daniel McLean and wife, and the following invited guests: A. M. Coulson of the Maritime Provincial Club of Worcester, and Miss Carrie McAlister; Mr. McPherson, Pres. Prov. Club, of Boston, and Mrs. McPherson; A. G. Chisholm, Vice Pres. International Club, and Miss Nellie Mitchell, Pres. Ladies Auxiliary Maritime Provincial Club; and about two hundred couples. After the march the dancing commenced and was continued until two o'clock. Over 1200 former residents of this Province were in attendance.

NOTWITHSTANDING the inclement weather last evening, a good number attended the evangelistic service in Zion Church. Earnest addresses were given regarding the mission of the Holy Spirit by the Revs. Mr. Egan and T. J. Robertson. HON. DR. DOUGLAS, speaker of the House of Assembly came in from Hants' River yesterday. He is registered at the Queen.

FRANK FRASER, of the Anglo American Telegraph Co. returned yesterday from Cape Bear Station. He was relieved by Frank Stewart of Sackville who went down on Saturday evening.

By those who were acquainted with her the sad news of the death of Mrs. Edward Brown, of this City, which occurred on Sunday night will be heard with deep sorrow. She had only been married a little more than two years and her early taking away from the scenes of this life will be deplored by many.

No fore gn mails left the city last night, as there was no steamer at Georgetown. The Milano did not proceed far in the storm then raging and soon became blocked in the ice which which the straits appear to be pretty well filled. The Stanley did not venture to leave Pictou at all yesterday for Georgetown. In these circumstances it was apparently of little use sending a mail to Georgetown last night, especially as the weather is still unsettled and it is difficult to tell whether or not the steamers may be beset by heavy ice, and the ice boats at the Capes have to be resorted to.

YESTERDAY a keen and bitter east wind blew strongly all day, and with the thermometer registering near the zero mark, the conditions were not such as to make it very pleasant out-of-doors. The wind made it appear colder than it really was, and consequently not many people moved about and the streets in the evening presented a deserted appearance. Very little snow fell but what was down from the day before drifted considerably in places. On the railway track some deep drifts accumulated at different points but they were not deep enough to stop the traffic. With the exception of being a little late all the regular trains out yesterday ran as per timetable.

YESTERDAY was an unusually busy day at the City Police Court. The charge of infraction of the Prohibition Act against A. W. Reddin was dismissed, and the charge against Patrick McAlister, of a fine of \$200, or four months' imprisonment. In the Reddin case the magistrate delivered an important judgment, the chief points in which appear elsewhere in this paper. The hearing of the charge against young Galbraith, of stealing brasserie, from the railway, was adjourned all today after some time being spent in hearing evidence. Two boys, McMurrer and McPhee appeared charged with trying to pass a worthless bill of \$5 denomination of the defunct Bank of Prince Edward Island. This bill it appears was obtained by McMurrer's father some time last summer, and has ever since been kept in the house, the father knowing it to be worthless. A short time ago however, McMurrer the elder was sent to jail for violation of the Prohibition Act, and a few days ago the boy got hold of the note and endeavored to pass it in the store of Mrs. Stephen Whitty, Queen Street. The evidence did not show that the boy was aware that he was trying to pass a bad bill and he and his companion were discharged.
