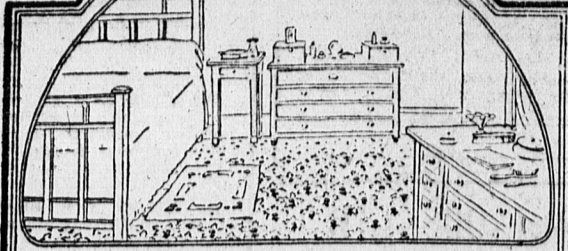

General Thacker and Col Anderson leave this morning for Halifax. He expressed himself as greatly pleased.

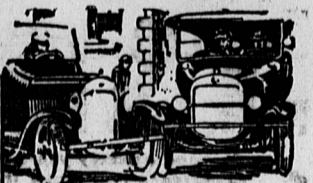
Miss Nellie Bernard, Principal of Gramam's Road school has returned to her duties after spending the holidays with her parents in North Rustico.

Formula Discovered

Method of Making Zeppelin Framework Is Found

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. 30—Scientists in a Pittsburgh steel mill have discovered a formula, long sought by British and United States naval authorities, which the Germans used in the construction of frameworks of Zeppelin dirigibles, according to an announcement from the Philadelphia navy yard.

Hitherto, it was said at the navy yards, nothing has been known of the composition of the aluminum alloy used in the framework of Zeppelins, save that it was lighter than steel and of great tensile strength, despite careful experiments both in the U.S. and Great Britain ever since the first aircraft of the Zeppelin type was shot down and its framework analyzed.

BATHURST, March 31.—Bathurst is seriously inconvenienced as the result of the destruction of the White House, this week. The White House was the only hotel in town, the Robertson House having been destroyed by fire several years ago. Fire in the White House was discovered at 1.30 o'clock on Sunday morning. All the guests were aroused and no person was injured. The party exit from the burning structure, but some of them did not have the opportunity to carry out all their effects. It is probable that another hotel will be erected within a short time.

HELSINGFORS, March 31.—A violent cannonade was heard today in the direction of Kronstadt. It was attributed to an attack on the Swedish fort by sailors from Petrodraw from Archangel.

STOCKHOLM, March 30.—Anti-Bolshevik mutiny among the sailors of the Russian White Sea squadron is reported in Helsingfors advices. The mutiny originated according to the rumor, on the cruiser Tchesa.
