Mr. Weir was met at Borden by Hon. G. Shelton Sharp, Minister of Public Works, Mr. J. F. Arnett, Mr. George A. Calbeck, President of the C. N. S. P. A., and motored direct to Summerside where, upon his arrival he met prominent fox breeders at the head office of the Association and discussed matters pertaining to the fox industry.

On Saturday evening Hon. Mr. Weir was the guest of honour at an informal dinner at the Clifton Hotel, tendered by the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association. Mr. George Calbeck presided and read an address as president of the Fox Breeders Association. He then called upon Mayor E. W. Manson who addressed the Minister and extended a very cordial welcome from the citizens of Summerside.

It is with regret that we record the death, which occurred yesterday at her home, 24 Upper Hillsboro Street, of Mrs. J. R. Burnett, wife of the editor and managing director of the Guardian. The deceased had been in delicate health for some time, but had been confined to bed only for the past fortnight.

Mrs. Burnett was a daughter of the late Mr. J. B. Trotter, of Colinton, Mid-Lothian, Scotland, and of Taymouth Manor, Essequibo, British Guiana, sugar planter. Her maternal grandfather was the Rev. Charles Theodore Moore, of Drogheda, County Donegal, Ireland, chaplain to Her Majesty's forces, and the first missionary of the Church of England to the Carib Indians. He accompanied, in 1873, the late Sir Everard Im Thurn on his eventful journey to the famous Kaieteur Falls and Mount Roraima in the hinterland of British Guiana, and assisted in the preparation of Sir Everard's work "Among the Indians of Guiana."

Mrs. Burnett was of a gentle, retiring disposition, and, apart from her family, her interests were most largely centered in the Church. She loved God, the Church, her home, the young, music and flowers; while no appeal for help was ever made to her in vain. She was an active member of St. James Presbyterian Church Missionary Society, of which she was First Vice-President; a member of the Ladies' Aid of St. James Church, and, until her first illness, of St. James Choir. Mrs. Burnett was also a member of St. James Church Boy Scouts Committee, and of the Ladies' Aid of the Prince Edward Island Boy Scouts Association. She took an active interest in the Caledonian Club and organized one of the most successful concerts in connection with its Lecture Courses. She was a member of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, in the work of which she was ever deeply interested.

In addition to her husband, she was survived by five sons and one adopted son, viz: Ian Allan, William Robertson, Niall Hope, James Evelyn, George Mathieson and John Penny; one brother, David G. Trotter, sugar planter, Essequibo, B.G., and three sisters, Mrs. Angus Inglis, Glasgow, Scotland; Mrs. Dalrymple Jones, and Miss Ethel Trotter, Georgetown, B.G.

## TAKING IN BUOYS—

During the last two weeks the C. G. S. Arranmore and the C. G. S. Brant have been taking in the buoys from the coast waters surrounding the province. All the buoys have been collected with the exception of those in Charlottetown harbour. Yesterday the Arranmore took up the Tormentine bell buoy and the Try-on buoy. the Queen's County jail in readiness to receive neat iron posts, which will be placed in concrete, and to which will be secured a modern nine foot chain link protection fence.

This fence will be of No. 6 gauge, 2 inch mesh galvanized steel wire, with a one foot barbed wire overhang—projecting outward instead of inward, as is the case in most all fences of this type.

The reason for this will be readily understood—to prevent outside friends of the inmates from passing in contraband goods.

This fence is similar to that which encloses St. Hubert Airport, and Molson's Stadium (New McGill) of Montreal, and besides providing against intruders, who have a habit of visiting this institution without permits, will make the place a little more attractive.

The fence is manufactured by the Security Fence Co., a subsidiary of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, the wholesale dealers for Prince Edward Island being Buntain Bell and Co., city.
