MONUMENT LIGHTS FINISHED. Yesterday the Maritime Light and Power Co., completed the erection of the two standards in front of the Soldiers Memorial and they were turned on for the first time last night. Each of the standards, which are of handsome design standing on a two foot concrete base and fifteen feet in height contains three lights one 150 candle power and two 100 candle power. The six provide a brilliant illumination that shows up the monument with fine effect at night.
