THE COOK'S CORNER

HARVEST MOON FROSTING
 3 egg whites, unbeaten
 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
 Dash of salt
 1-4 cup water
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 3-4 cup almonds, blanched, toasted and chopped.

Put egg whites, sugar, salt, and water in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, beat constantly with rotary egg beater and cook 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from fire, add vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread. Add nuts. Makes enough frosting to cover top and side of 8x2 cake.

EASY DECORATIVE FROSTING
 One-third cup sweetened condensed milk
 1-4 tablespoons butter
 1-3 teaspoon vanilla
 3-4 cup confectioner's sugar sifted.

Cream sweetened condensed milk and butter together. Add vanilla, blending well. Add sifted confectioner's sugar gradually and beat until smooth, creamy and light in color.

HONEY FROSTING
 1 cup honey
 2 egg whites

Boil honey 10 minutes or to 238 degrees F. Cool while beating egg whites until stiff. Pour on honey in thin stream, beatig constantly until thick enough to spread. Cool before spreading on cake.

CARROT LOAF
 1 cup canned cooked peas
 1 cup cooked, washed carrots
 1-2 cup walnuts or other nut meats
 3 tablespoons minced onion
 1 tablespoon melted fat
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 cup soft bread crumbs
 1 cup milk
 2 eggs, beaten
 1-2 teaspoon pepper
 2 cups tomato sauce

Mix ingredients in order given, omitting tomato sauce, and put in a greased loaf pan.
 Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees Fahrenheit for 60 minutes.
 Serve with a well seasoned tomato sauce. Serves about 6.
