NEW JAILER IS BOSS

Mr. George Leslie, the New Jailer Puts Down Insubordination and Puts Fear Into the Hearts of Prisoners.

Some of the easy going prisoners in Queen's County Jail are not taking too kindly to the change in administration, with the result that Mr. Leslie, the new jailer, who is a big, muscular type, has had to prove to them that he is boss and must be obeyed. Yesterday morning a scrap occurred in the jail kitchen, when some blood was spilt. The affair started about nine o'clock when the jailer asked a prisoner to dump some garbage. Prisoner refused, saying he "didn't have to." He was told he would be locked in his cell if he did not do what he was told. Prisoner laughed, and said "try it." With that Leslie lifted him in his arms and headed for the cell. That was the signal for the other prisoners to join in a melee. They gathered round the jailer, bumped him, threatened him, and ultimately attempted to seize him for the purpose of releasing his captive. But the prisoner went to the cell, the jailer effectively striking out right and left to accomplish his purpose, with the result that some of the prisoners lost blood copiously and sustained other injuries. When he had safely locked up "public enemy No. 1" the jailer returned and seized a couple of others who were ring-leaders, and locked them up also. He told the others that unless they obeyed his orders instantly they would receive similar solitary confinement. Result: He got complete control of the situation, and within half an hour everything was going along better than usual. When the disturbance was at its height, one of the prisoners threw a jug of molasses at the jailer. He immediately told them it would be some molasses to throw away, and intends to be as good as his word.

Railway Wharf

S. S. Havmoyn, Captain Knudsen, arrived in port yesterday morning from St Johns via Sydney, N.S., and is at present loading 50,000 bags of turnips and 5,000 bags of potatoes for New York. These were shipped jointly by the Canada Packers and the Associated Shippers Inc. This steamer is only six months old and was built in Australia for the lumber trade.

Island Fertiliser Co's Wharf

S. S. Hochelaga, Captain Wells, which has been making daily trips between this port and Pictou, N.S., finished her season's operations yesterday and after loading some thousand feet of lumber for the Standard Construction Company in Halifax, bid farewell to Charlottetown, and sailed for Pictou, N.S., enroute to Halifax, N.S., where she will be laid up for the winter months.

The S. S. Farnorth, Captain Turner, is expected in port today to load a general cargo for Sydney, St. Pierre and St. John's, Nfld.

The Government launch D.P.W., Captain James Lund, has been hauled up and placed in her winter quarters along with the small government dredge which has been doing repairs and dredging to wharves and rivers around the Island.

S. S. Homewood, Captain V. O. Pearson, arrived in port last evening from Montreal, having 310 tons of freight inward. She will load an outward cargo of 7,125 bags of potatoes and oats for St. John's, Nfld.

The government tug Fredericton, Captain Dick, arrived in port yesterday and will lay up here for the winter months at Bruce Stewart & Co. wharf.

C. G. S. Cartier, Captain Roach, is now laid up for the winter months.

The D. P. W. dredge Pownal No. 2, Captain Murchison, is laid up in Rustico for the winter, and the tug Bally, Captain Genie, which has been attending to the above dredge this past summer, is expected to lay up in Charlottetown.

Work along the waterfront at the present time is going over in a big way, an exceptionally large number of men being employed owing to potato, fertilizer and freight boats all being in port at the one time.

The S. S. Spec, Captain Tennyson, arrived in port yesterday from Hamburg, Germany, via Halifax, N.S. with a part cargo of fertilizer for the Island Fertiliser Company, part of cargo being discharged in Halifax.

The D. P. W. dredge No. 9, Captain Cosgrove, is at present dredging in Montague, and is being attended to by the Tug Amla Captain Burnham.

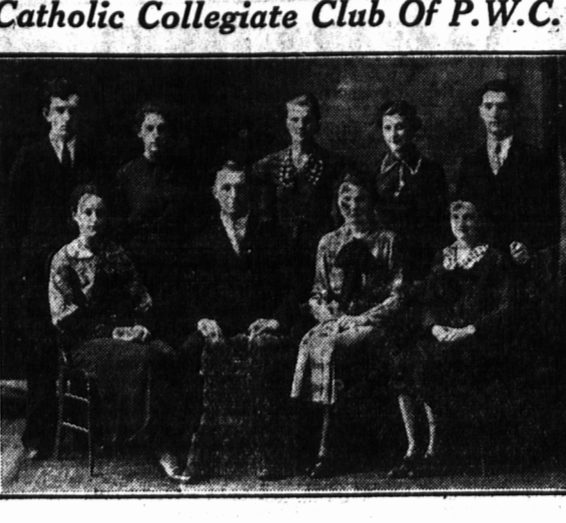
