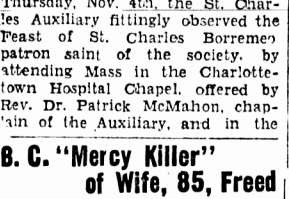

The objective of the drive is \$50,000, and the appeal is to the Acadians only. I have much pleasure in supporting a drive which would tend to give the Acadian boys an opportunity comparable to that enjoyed by other ethnic groups in our Province.
