OF SPECIAL INTEREST

EL PASO, Texas, July 29 (Special)—Depredations against the American flag continue in Mexico. Charles Bielef, Southwestern representative of the Mines Company of America, of New York, has been taken prisoner by Orozco at Chihuahua, while en route to his mines at Elrayo, and is now being held as a prisoner of war and has been threatened to be shot. At Durango the American flag was shot full of holes, dragged from the flagpole and spat upon by the rebels who have taken possession of the town. At Pearson the Americans continue to be held for ransom. Four Mexicans who are American citizens have been forced to pay \$400 each for their release, while several Chinese have been shot. Among refugees from the lumber camps who arrived here today say Benjamin Aguiere, a merchant of Durango arrived with the details of the outrages which occurred at Durango upon the occasion of the rebels taking and stacking that town under command of General Urbina. The Aguiere store was dynamited of all its contents, the merchant says, and the house was searched for Americans, who were threatened with death. An Englishman named Howard Palmer was killed when he refused to cheer for Madero, and many Americans were subjected to the worst outrages. The Americans fled from the town and sought safety in the interior. Aguiere says, and the party of refugees, including Mrs. Daniel Bolger and her fourteen months' old baby, Mrs. P. H. Matthews, Mrs. St. Hours and a number of members of the foreign colony. They were forced to go 130 miles to the nearest railroad station, thirty of the party being forced to walk all the distance.

ROME, July 30 (Special)—Negotiations are in progress with one of the ablest of the Italian criminal lawyers to obtain his services in defending Porter Charlton, the American who recently was ordered extradited from the United States to stand trial before the Assizes Court at Como on a charge of murdering his wife in Lake Como in 1910. The lawyer, if he accepts, also will be requested to watch the case on behalf of the United States government.

PORT-AU-SPAIN, Aug. 2 (Special)—It is reported here that a small party of Venezuelan revolutionists made an unsuccessful attack on the port of Cristobal Colon, and that General Bustamante, on board a government war ship is now in pursuit of them. Cristobal Colon is a port on the peninsula of Paria, in the northeastern part of Venezuela. The town lies
