Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

Continued dry weather has caused irreparable damage to all crops in large areas in Saskatchewan and Alberta. Showers have relieved the situation in localities but prospects on the whole are not encouraging and less than an average yield is now expected. Crops are late and short in straw. In Quebec recent heavy rains and cool weather have somewhat retarded growth on lower lands but conditions, generally, are still very satisfactory. In Ontario while rain during the past week has improved grass pastures the cutting of hay has been delayed and farmers are experiencing difficulty in curing. Fall

wheat heads have filled heavily and indications point towards an average crop. There are good prospects for tree fruits in the Maritime Provinces. General growing conditions are favourable, especially in Prince Edward Island, but more rain would be beneficial in Nova Scotia. In British Columbia weather conditions have been favourable for practically all crops and an excellent crop of hay is now being harvested. Details follow:—

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

ALBERTA. Hot dry weather has caused further damage in northeastern and north of western area and a large proportion of the crop in this section has been irreparably damaged. Wheat heading out in many cases will be too short to harvest. Coarse grains, pasture and hay are poor. Conditions in south of western area are generally favourable and pasture is in good condition. **ALBERTA SOUTHERN AREA.** Conditions are favourable but there is no moisture reserve. **SASKATCHEWAN NORTH ERN AREA.** Moisture conditions are fairly satisfactory but the weather has been cool and crops remain back-

ward. Wheat, although short, is in shot blade with some heading out. Prospects are somewhat below average. **SASKATCHEWAN SOUTHERN AREA.** With the exception of the southwestern portion where conditions are satisfactory and in a few other localities, continued dry weather has damaged crops and rain is urgently needed to relieve the situation. **MANITOBA.** Moderate temperature and scattered showers have improved crop conditions to some extent but more moisture is urgently needed throughout entire province and in some districts the situation is critical. All crops will be short.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Cutting of hay has commenced in some districts and with favourable weather a heavy crop is assured, and root crops are looking well. Small fruits give promise of a large yield. A period of warm weather is now needed.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Spring wheat is late, the straw is short and the yield will likely be below average. Corn now shows good growth and colour. Tree fruits generally will be an average crop, apples being especially good with cherries only average. Peaches are somewhat late and a little less than average crop is expected. Tomatoes are well advanced with good settings of the smooth variety. Tobacco is growing fast in certain localities. Sand storms have done some harm. The pea crop in Prince Edward County is estimated at only 35% of normal.

MARITIME PROVINCES

Potatoes though late show splendid growth. Grass pastures are very good. Hay in some districts is ready to cut and a fair crop is now expected. Prospects are for an above average apple crop.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

The cherry crop is poor, many trees being damaged by blight. Raspberries are being picked, but the yield is below average. Potatoes and other root crops are doing well. Pasture is plentiful. The estimated yield of apples 90% of the average crop; peaches, plums, prunes and apricots 85%; pears 90%; hops 100%.

Pres. Beatty's Maritime Itinerary

MONTREAL, Que., July 15.—The itinerary of a tour of the three Maritime Provinces by E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, leaving Montreal Sunday afternoon was given out from headquarters of the company here today.

Mr. Beatty will include motoring and yachting in the trip. The itinerary is as follows: leaving Montreal Tuesday afternoon his special train will pass through Sherbrooke and Megantic on its way to Saint John which he will reach Wednesday, July 17th, and will go on to Truro arriving the same day at noon.

He will take the Dominion Atlantic Railway special via Kentville and Digby to Yarmouth staying overnight at the Pines Hotel, Digby, and reaching Yarmouth Thursday morning. From Yarmouth he will motor via Kentville and Bridgewater to Halifax where he will arrive at 12:15 Friday afternoon.

From Halifax the trip will take in Sydney, July 20 and Charlottetown July 21. He will stay all Sunday at Charlottetown, leaving Prince Edward Island Monday, and will proceed via Sackville to Saint John where he is due to arrive Tuesday morning, July 23rd.

Mr. Beatty will take a yacht trip up the Saint John River and will later take a motor trip of 136 miles through Gagetown, Fredericton, St. Stephens and St. Andrews. Resuming his train journey from St. Andrews the President will pass through McAdam, Woodstock, Edmundston, Presque Isle and Brownville, July 24th and 25th and passing through Megantic, Sherbrooke and Parnham will be back in Montreal Thursday afternoon, July 26th.

McDougall Segur No. 2 has done no new drilling and now is taking production with the well making about 68 barrels per day. Preparations going ahead for deepening No. 1 well where casing collapsed at 2,425 feet. Will resume drilling at 1,650 feet.
