Financial Showing Best Of Any Canadian Province Premier MacMillan Shows

Estimated Decrease In Total Expenditures Over 1934 Of \$57,855.31. Striking Contrast Made In Premier's Budget Speech With Wholesale Extravagance Under Liberal Administration Which In Its Last Eight Months Piled Up Debt Of Over Half A Million Dollars And In Four Years Accumulated 50 P.C. Of Province's Whole Indebtedness.

Budgeting for a surplus on ordinary account, exclusive of sinking funds, of \$37,217 for the current fiscal year, Premier the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan in the Legislature last evening delivered a comprehensive address, covering every phase of the Province's financial problems and briefly outlining the Government's activities in every department, contrasting the expenditures incurred during the past and preceding years with Liberal expenditures and showing that notwithstanding the many additional responsibilities shouldered by the present administration, the contrast, from an expenditure standpoint, was decidedly in the Conservatives' favor.

There was a large attendance of visitors last evening, including many ladies. The Premier, who spoke for upwards of two and a half hours, was enthusiastically applauded. Mr. W. Leas, leader of the Opposition, followed, and after speaking for about twenty minutes, moved the adjournment. The House adjourned until 3 p.m. today.

Presenting the Government's final budget before appealing to the electors, Premier MacMillan estimated a total ordinary revenue of \$1,496,271 as against a total estimated expenditure of \$1,539,259, leaving a surplus exclusive of sinking funds of \$37,217, as against a deficit on ordinary account of \$142,567 in 1934.

The detailed estimated expenditure was submitted as follows: Department of Justice, \$64,175; Agriculture, \$51,230; Executive Council, \$3,750; Education, \$34,400; Elections, \$7,500; Health, \$34,984; Falconwood Hospital and Infirmary, \$93,580; Interest, \$240,115; Legislation, \$16,650; Legislative Library, \$3,025; Legislative grants, \$48,700; Miscellaneous, \$3,000; Direct Relief, \$27,000; Postage, etc., \$2,400; Treasury, \$11,330; Motor Vehicle Expenses, \$5,500; Gasoline rebates, \$28,000; Audit office, \$3,150; Purchasing Agent, \$1,071; Provincial Building, \$4,400; Old Age Pensions paid, \$170,000; Public Works, \$250; Department of Telegrams, \$286,620; Unforeseen expenditures, \$1,000; Sinking Fund provision, \$140,205. Making a total estimated expenditure for 1935 of \$1,539,259, a decrease over the 1934 expenditures of \$37,665.31.

A commendable precedent was set by the Premier this year in labelling in his budget speech, estimated revenue for the year. A summary of the figures tabled follows: Dominion Government (Federal subsidy, direct relief, Old Age Pensions) \$784,681.88; General property and income tax, etc., \$195,000; Corporation taxes, \$104,200; Other taxes, \$225,000; Licenses, \$101,840; Fines and penalties, \$500; Fees collected, \$30,450.

LIQUOR CONSPIRACY CASE ADJOURNS UNTIL WEDNESDAY
