New System of Government is Proposed for Fraternal Order--Big C. P. R. Building

Special to The Guardian. TORONTO, March 26-Government in the Independent Order of Foresters in all parts of the world by a Supreme Court is expected to follow the next Supreme Court session in Toronto, commencing May 2.

This is a radical change and will throw the responsibility for the direction of the order upon the Supreme Court, which meets every four years. The proposal is to dispense with the annual meetings of the High Courts and devote the money saved to the work of the Orphan's Home in Deseronto and the Consumption Sanitarium at Rainbow Lake in Adirondacks.

The Trader's Bank building at the corner of Yonge and Colborne streets which has enjoyed the distinction of being the tallest commercial building in the British Empire, is to be overshadowed by its next door neighbour. The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. will erect a structure sixteen stories high, one story higher than the bank.
