MONTREAL, April 6.—Dr. G. R. Parkin, who recently completed a tour of the British self-governing colonies and the United States, in connection with the Rhodes scholarship, reached this city tonight on his return to Canada.

In an interview he expressed the opinion that there would be gratifying representation of Canadian students at Oxford, at least twenty-four all the time, the best being perpetual. This could not be otherwise than most beneficial to the dominion and to the whole of the British Empire.

During his tour, Dr. Parkin observed great appreciation of the scholarships by all the colonies, but he said that to fully realize the magnitude of Cecil Rhodes' conception and his wonderful achievement, it is necessary to study conditions in Rhodesia and other parts of the Dark Continent.

South Africa had already sent her first contingent of students to Oxford. Canada would send eight this year, eight more next year, and the rest of the twenty-four in 1908. Great interest in the scholarships had been apparent in the United States and in New York, from which state one representative is to be sent, no less than forty candidates are to be examined.

Speaking of South Africa politics, Dr. Parkin said that if England sends good men there and trusts them and does not make affairs there a shuttlecock for house politicians, the country will come on all right.

Dr. Parkin makes his next official visit to Newfoundland. He, however, will spend a few days here. He expects to go to Toronto and other educational centres.

Earthquakes in England.

The last earthquake of any considerable violence in England occurred on March 8, 1750. Such disturbances are not so infrequent in the British Isles as many suppose; but it must be admitted they are generally very slight. Even in that notoriously mobile district about Comrie, in Perthshire—when during the winter 1839-40 they had a hundred and forty earthquakes, being at the rate of about a shock a day at an average—they seldom do much harm.

The year 1750 is the year par excellence of English earthquakes. It opened with most unseasonable weather, the heat being, according to Walpole, "beyond what was ever known in any other country;" and on the 8th of February a pretty smart shock was experienced, followed exactly a month later by a second and severer one. The excitement in London was intense. "Following the example of Bishops Secker and Sherlock, the clergy showered down sermons and exhortations, and a country quack sold pills 'as good against an earthquake.'"

J. W. V. Lawlor Leaves to Tour Jamaica and Cuba in Party of Ten Prize Winners.

J. W. V. Lawlor, maritime manager for the McLaughlin Carriage Co., left for Boston last night en route to Jamaica and Cuba. This is a trip he has earned and will be taken in company with ten other gentlemen. Some time ago J. Mitchell Chappel, publisher of the National Magazine, Boston, asked ideas on how to make his magazine circulation 1,000,000. Mr. Lawlor entered the competition and ten winners out of 5,000 competitors were chosen. He is one of the ten and the reward is a tour of Jamaica and Cuba under escort of Mr. Chappel.

The party will leave Boston tomorrow morning on the steamer Admiral Dewey and will return to Boston three weeks later.—St. John Telegraph, April 8.

"DRUMMER" TACKLED THE WRONG MAN.

Detective Power Had a Lively Tussle With a Montreal Traveller—Three of Them Arrested.

On warrants charging them with setting fire to the Queen Hotel three commercial travellers were arrested yesterday. They were Charles E. Gotham, Montreal; H. P. Wilson, Toronto; and Ben Myers, Montreal. The arrests were made by Detective Power, assisted by officers Rudland and Kennedy. Gotham resisted arrest and started in on the Detective, but the latter after a lively tussel showed the Montrealer that he was the best man. With his hat jammed down tightly over his head Gotham was hustled out of the Queen Hotel on the "double," placed in a hack and driven to the station. Some time later all three were released on bail, \$400 each being put up for their appearance in Court to-day.

The trio boarded the Halifax Hotel, but it is alleged that they visited the Queen late on Tuesday night in search of a friend whom they failed to find in his room. Just what occurred there is not known, but afterwards everything in the room was found either broken or turned upside down, and soon afterward the place was discovered to be on fire.

From the investigation made by the police it was learned that an electric lamp with the current on was placed under the bed clothing, and shortly after two o'clock yesterday morning the room was discovered to be on fire. Some of the guests on the same landing detected the smoke, and after some hard work the flames were extinguished. It is supposed that the fire started from the electric lamp.

The affair caused great excitement for a time, and the arrest of these men is the outcome.—Halifax Chronicle.
