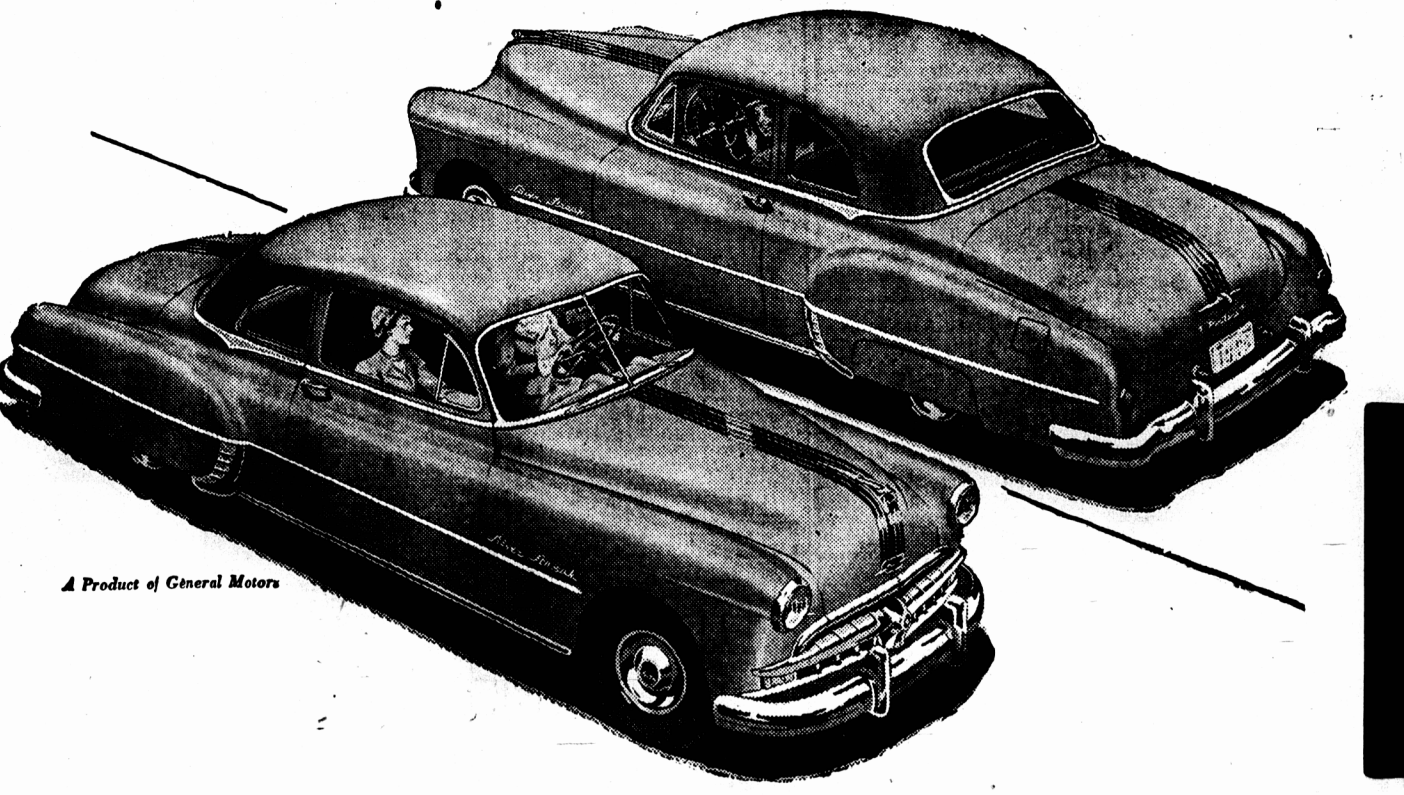
THE CHAMP
