Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section in good lands his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entry. A homesteader may live on his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.


A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years after entry. A homesteader may live on his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

This is Sunday morning and we are getting ready for church parade. It does not take us long to get ready as there is no clearing buttons or polishing boots over here. Out of two weeks we have only had the pleasure of having one day without rain it is almost impossible to keep our feet dry even with a clean pair of socks every night. Although we have wet feet, there is very few sick or with bad colds. Up to the present we have had no snow or frost and the ground is like the spring of the year in Canada about the first of May. I have not received a letter or parcel from Canada since Dec. 15th, so you see I have received no Christmas parcels. I guess we will receive them through time. Well mother as we have had no mail for some time I will have to close.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—According to official telegrams from Athens the ceremony of saluting the flags of the Entente nations in compliance with one of the demands made on the Greek government for disturbances at Athens last month was carried out in a satisfactory manner. Prince Andrew of Greece personally led the Greek cavalry in a march past the flags yesterday afternoon. The crowds which collected in the neighborhood made no disturbances. All other demands of the Allies are to be met to their satisfaction.

I am very thankful to those people, hoping that some day if I am spared to come back, I may be able to thank them personally. I also received your cake. I must thank you also for the beautiful cake you sent me. It was lovely and moist. The tin it was in I used for my wash. One thing I am glad to hear is that papa has all the work he can do, so things must be pretty busy. I suppose Russ has a high old time out shooting most of the time, does he ever take Hunter out with him for a run? If he does let me know if he is doing good. Well mother I suppose Canada is full of Kaiser Bill's peace terms? We just got the news about the great drive the French made on the Verdun front. While I am writing this letter the fellows are gloating over some good news from the Rumanian front. They claim that Russia has all the Germans surrounded that got into Rumania. I think that the dark clouds inside out till I come home. I haven't been near the danger zone for nearly a month and won't be for a time to come, so don't worry when there is no need to. Well mother I have written all I can think of at present, so I will come to a close. Wishing you all a Happy New Year from your loving son,


