PRIZE ESSAY CONTEST

The attention of the school chil-
dren of this province is called to
the Prize Essay Contest offered in
this issue by the Life Under-
writers Association of P.E.I. The
object is two fold: first to arouse
an interest in the aims and pur-
poses of life insurance and second-
ly to stimulate the pupils in their
ambition to express themselves in
good English. The prizes offered
in this contest will be an incentive
to pupils all over the province to ex-
cel in composition which in itself
is a prize that cannot be too high-
ly valued in our educational sys-
tem. The Life Insurance Com-
panies here belonging to the Life
Underwriters Associations, branches
of which are organized in
every Canadian province, are de-
siring of growing prize contribu-
ting prizes for this purpose and
we have no doubt but that the con-
test will be heartily entered into
and prove very successful. That
all teachers having pupils under
the age of sixteen will take an
interest in encouraging the chil-
dren to participate in this competi-
tion is an assured fact in view of
the hearty endorsement given by
Mr. R. H. Rogers, Chief Supt. of
Education who says: "It is greatly
desired that our boys and girls
should develop their powers of ex-
pression in writing and to that end
should be encouraged to write with
a view to the submitting of their
work to criticism and examination. It
is also desirable that school ac-
tivities should be more closely re-
lated to practical affairs than is
usually the case." As to the prac-
tical aspect of the question there

he could. The father had given his
son all he might want in purchas-
able goods, but had not given that
greater gift of all, the friendship
of a father, the sympathy of a real
friend and the personal touch that
would have made the ailments
of the underworld just so much
dust and ashes.

In closing Mr. Bonnell told in his
own graphic way the great change
that had come over a group of
typical "bad boys" of a certain com-
munity when an understanding
man took charge. The boys were in
a mire of bad habits and petty
vices, those who were lifted out by
their own or by others' efforts.

back. Instead of keeping safely on
the edge and lifting up a boy
conveniently, this minister went
right with the boys, played their
games, lived their lives, was so
much one of them that he gradu-
ally lifted them out of the mire and
made them into honest, truthful,
reliable young men.

that's before us as the parents and
older brothers of these boys,"
counselled the speaker, "and let us
face this duty clearly and unflinch-
ingly, like men."

Harold Simpson, Secretary of the
Prince County Y. M. C. A. was
greeted with prolonged applause
when he arose to make a brief re-
port upon the work of the "Y" for
the last six months or so. Bon-
nell, who presided, explained the
"Y" co-operated with the
churches in the formation of
Tuxis squares at Kensington, Al-
berton, Bedeque, Malpeque, Caven-
dish as well as Summerside. Due
to the united efforts of the com-
munities, the churches and some
men in each congregation who were
really consecrated to the bet-
terment of boy life, the work
among the boys of Prince County
has been most successful during
the last year and the prospect for
the future was very bright. Sec-
retary Simpson showed in his report
that through the work of the Y. M.
C. A. and the churches there are
185 boys organized for C. S. E. T.
work. This combines the 12 groups
in 4 centres of 13 churches. The
activities for the last year include
Athletic meets, the organization of
a baseball league, school fairs, and
the attendance at the Military
camps held in Charlottetown. The
secretary reminded his hearers
that curing an evil tendency was
the plan of an older day, to prevent
wrong by right example and sug-
gestion is the policy of the present.
Considering that there are 300 or
more teen-age in Summerside and
another large number in the re-
mainder of Prince County, there
was a wonderful chance for all
conscientious men to serve, real-
izing that the boy is the greatest
asset of any country and most val-
uable in the plastic age of 14 to
19 years.
