

VICTIMS LURED TO THEIR DEATH

Matrimonial Advertisement Circulated By Mrs. Belle Guinness. Letters Discovered Which Are Said to Implicate Lamphere.

LAPORTE, Ind., May 9.—From out of the maze of tangled and sensational evidence which indicates that Mrs. Belle Guinness was one of the most notorious murderers of the country, and that her beautiful farm a mile from Laporte, was a clearing house of assassination and crime, there developed today the startling theory that the woman did not die in the fire which destroyed her home on the night of April 28, and that she is still alive and in hiding, probably in Chicago. This theory is strengthened by the fact that the head of the body of the woman found in the ruins of the Guinness home after the fire, is still missing although effort to find it has been made by the authorities even to going through the charred timbers piece by piece. Unless the head is found today, the officers will make a post mortem examination of the remains of Mrs. Guinness to learn whether the woman was herself killed in the fire or had substituted the remains of one of her female victims for herself and then set fire to the house in order to cover up the crime.

Following is the matrimonial advertisement which was lured to their death by Mrs. Belle Guinness on whose farm at Laporte, Ind., nine bodies have been unearthed, and who, herself, is supposed to have been done to death along with her three children, and an attempt made to cover the crime by burning down the house.

Comely widow, who owns large farm in one of the finest districts in Laporte County, Indiana, desires to make the acquaintance of gentleman unusually well provided, with view to joining fortunes. No replies by letter considered unless sender is willing to follow answer by personal visit.

A GRISLY STORY

The grisly story of the private graveyard at the farm of Mrs. Belle Guinness, a mile north of Laporte, is still in its early chapters. Today the estimates of the number of persons murdered at the place through the lure of a matrimonial bureau run all the way from twelve to twenty.

The exhumation yesterday of four dismembered bodies wrapped in burlap brings the total of victims known to have been murdered to nine. Including the bodies supposed to be those of Mrs. Guinness and her three children, discovered after the fire which burned the farm house on April 28, the total of deaths to be investigated and accounted for is 11.

There was scant doubt that Sheriff Smutzler to-day would discover evidence of murder in two or more suspected graves as yet unopened.

Guy Lamphere, who is in jail here, still asserts his innocence. Prosecuting Attorney Smith, however, says he has positive proof that Lamphere had guilty knowledge of the Guinness murders, if he had not indeed participated in them.

The prosecutor is in possession of letters, written in Norwegian, which he is carefully guarding. These letters, written to Andrew Helgelein by Mrs. Guinness, are said to contain references which indicate Lamphere's guilt. That he killed Mrs. Guinness and her children, and set fire to the house in order to prevent any revelation that might involve him, is the theory of the prosecution.

A CHAMBER OF HORRORS.

In his cell Lamphere was asked concerning a secret room in the Guinness country mansion, to which no one was ever admitted except Mrs. Guinness herself. She had the key and kept the door constantly locked. In the night hours no one in the household was ever near that room. That, the authorities believe, was the chamber of horrors, whose walls must have been spattered with blood of the ill-fated victims of the woman's greed for gold and thirst for blood.

"I never was in the room said Lamphere. I knew there was a room in the house that was always kept locked, and there was also a room in the basement, a sort of box that no one ever knew much about. It was a big place, capable of accommodating several persons. This place near a door which led out to the

anyard, is believed to have been the temporary morgue for the victims. So many bodies have been found that the authorities believe the woman saved her victims and disarticulated the bodies in groups and buried them that way, sewed up in gunny sacks, adding chloride of lime to the earth to aid disintegration.

Laporte, Ind., May 11.—All roads in Laporte county now lead to the farm of Mrs. Belle Guinness, alleged murderer of at least ten persons, whose bodies have been unearthed in the barnyard, and now thought to have been burned to death with her three children in a fire that destroyed her farmhouse on April 28. Upwards of 15,000 sightseers visited the place before sunset on the first Sabbath to pass since the news of the mystery.
