## SAYS INDIA'S ARMY CAN EQUAL RUSSIA'S

CAIRO, November 28.—I have just obtained an interview with his Highness the Maharaja of Idar, Dhraj Shri Dolat Singhji, who is passing through Egypt on his way to join the general staff at the front. He is the fifth of the Indian princes to leave India on active service.

The Maharaja is the adopted son of the renowned Sir Pertab Singh. He was able to give an excellent idea of the great wave of imperial enthusiasm, loyalty, and devotion which, aroused by the war, has swept over the peoples of all races and creeds throughout the length and breadth of the Indian empire.

"The size of the Indian army which will take part in the great war," he told me, "depends, of course, on the wishes of the King Emperor, but I may say that every Indian, old and young would most gladly and enthusiastically respond to the King-Emperor's call."

"Our one difficulty is that only a comparatively small number of men may go to the battlefield at present. As it is, many officers and Indians of high rank are going in the ranks. My two saices, or grooms, are serving; my personal servant is very well-to-do, and they came with me because it was impossible for them to go in any other capacity. Even the Frooms who came to Bombay with our horses and then had to return back—home went away dejectedly and in tears. It was with great difficulty that they were persuaded to return."

The Maharaja told me a pathetic story of his own military secretary. After bidding farewell to the Maharaja the secretary, together with his family and friends, said good-by to them, and shot himself, overcome with grief that he could not proceed to the front with his master.

The Maharaja of Jodpur, who is only 17 years of age, was at first thought to be too young to serve away dejectedly and in tears. It was with great difficulty that they were persuaded to return."

The Maharaja told me a pathetic story of his own military secretary. After bidding farewell to the Maharaja the secretary, together with his family and friends, said good-by to them and shot himself, overcome with grief that he could not proceed to the front with his master.

Asked whether now that Turkey had entered the great world war, there was any feeling on the part of Mohammedans on the side of Turkey now? She is only a football, driven on and coerced by the Germans. She has no claim to represent Mohammedanism. No, indeed! We are all, without exception on the side of the empire to which we are so proud to belong.

"Take the case of Rajputana. That state has an army of 30,000 men, but no fewer than between 500,000 and 600,000 men have offered themselves and are willing and eager to serve. Nepal's army consists of 80,000 men. They are all at the Emperor's disposal.

"I, indeed, the Emperor requires an army as large as that of Russia. India is able to supply it, and will be proud to do so.

"So determined are the tremendous numbers of the people of India to fight for the King-Emperor that, if only the battlefield were nearer and not separated by seas from India, they would go even without orders to fight."

## UNIQUE TABLE LINEN.

A rather attractive conceit in the way of table linen, for an afternoon card party is a set of tablecloth and napkins embroidered with the playing-card symbols, spades, hearts, diamonds and clubs. The tablecloth, large enough for the ordinary low card table, is hemstitched at the edge and has the four symbols, one at each corner, embroidered in the appropriate black or red. Each serviette, or small lunch napkin, similarly hemstitched at the edge, has one of the symbols in one corner.

Such a set might easily be contrived by any woman who does simple embroidery, for the tablecloth and serviette may be picked up for a modest price and the clubs, spades and hearts and diamonds embroidered at home. On the serviette the symbols the about the size they are printed on playing cards; on the four corners of the tablecloth they may be a little larger—approximately the size of quarter dollars. One of these card party sets will make an excellent bridge prize, or may be acceptable Christmas remembrance for the hostess who often entertains at auction.

## WARM HANDS FOR THE MOTORIST.

Now that the automobile is being equipped with an electric generator for lighting, the motorist may have electrical gloves.

The gloves are lined with a fabric containing German silver wire wound in spirals about the fingers and fitting the backs and palms of the hands.

The wire presents a high resistance to the electric current which is supplied by the lighting generator of storage battery causing the coils to become heated and keeping the driver's hands warm.

A convenient connection to the electric current is formed by bringing the wires from the source of the current up to the steering wheel, where they terminate in metal plates covering the portion of the wheel where the hands touch.

Buttons on the fingers of the gloves make a contact with the plates on the steering wheel and conduct the current to the German silver coils within the gloves.

If the hands of the driver becomes too warm he simply changes their position on the steering wheel so that the contact between the plates and the buttons on the gloves is broken.

## CLINGING SKIRTS WORN BY LADIES OF 5500 B. C.

Three society ladies of Abydos, Egypt, have come to the University of Pennsylvania to show that the pendulum of fashion has swung as far back as 5500 B. C.

Beautifully carved in ivory, the visitors show that marocquins was the mode then, not only where the hair rests snugly on the head, but where it flows free over the shoulders. Still more striking are the scant skirts that cling about the ankles, while tunics are tucked out from the hips.

## CHRISTMAS-TREE SUPPORT KEEPS NEEDLES FRESH

A Christmas-tree holder which keeps the tree green and prevents the leaves from falling has been devised. It consists of a japanned pan which has a conical receptacle fitted in the middle of it into which the tree is set. Three metal braces, which may be folded down when not in use, extend from the rim of the pan and are screwed to the trunk of the tree. When the tree is in place, water is poured into the container, preventing the tree from drying out, and to a degree making it less inflammable.—From the December Popular Mechanic Magazine.

## HUMANE SLAUGHTERING.

The Behr pistol is now being used in England as a means of slaughtering animals in an up-to-date and humane manner. The instrument is a simple one. A small pattern is used for dogs, calves, sheep and pigs, and a heavier pattern is used for cattle. The pistol is in the nature of a pole axe worked by artificial means. One of its good features is, that it is absolutely safe to use. Another is that no bullet enters the animal, and the most important thing of all, from the humane point of view, is that the animal feels no pain at all, death being absolutely instantaneous. A cartridge forces the bolt, which returns to the barrel as the result of the action of compressed air. The bolt works with like rapidity, and death takes place on the instant.

## ALONE IN HIS GLORY.

No more impressive scene can be pictured, says an English paper, than the burial of a great soldier like the late Major General Hamilton than that described by a distinguished officer and one of his personal friends.

"He was standing with a group of others in a covered place when a shell burst one hundred yards off, and he was hit on the temple by a bullet and killed on the spot. No one else was touched. It was a fine death but I know how he would feel that he was taken before his work was done. He was buried last night with a soldier's funeral. I shall never forget it. All day we could not get near the place he was lying, owing to the heavy shell fire, but at dusk we went out and carried him to a little church near by and buried him there. Just as we got there the attack began violently, so that we could not hear the chaplain's voice for musketry and pom-pom fire close by. Flashes from the guns lit us up now and then, but no other light than a tiny torch for the person to see to read by. He was doing so splendidly that it was cruel luck that he should have been the one taken out of the group."

After this letter was written the body of Major General Hamilton was removed from its temporary resting place and conveyed to England for burial at St. Martin's Church, Chertiff. Eight sergeants of the Norfolk Regiment bore the coffin with the Union Jack to the grave. Lord Kitchener, who was represented by Major General Spens, sent a wreath inscribed,—"In affectionate remembrance," and on the tombstone appeared these lines:

Life is mostly froth and bubble,  
Two things stand like stone—  
Kindness in another's trouble,  
Courage in your own.
