### British Attitude On Debt Question Is Commended

PARIS, July 15.—Signing of the Franco-British debt agreement in London yesterday is hailed here not only as a noteworthy achievement by the Briand-Caillaux Government, but also as an object lesson to the United States. It is pointed out in diplomatic and official circles that Great Britain showed a greater understanding of France's position than did the American creditors, thus indicating that the benefits of a lenient attitude toward France are appreciated in England. The French attribute Great Britain's stand to realization in England that British interests depend to a great extent upon French prosperity.

M. Caillaux, after signing the agreement, returned from London yesterday by aeroplane and went into conference with M. Moreau, Governor of the Bank of France, and managers of all the leading Paris banks. They discussed measures to halt the decline of the franc.
