—The latest news, first of all.

—Mrs J. A. Meek, French River, is visiting in Summerside, the guest of Arthur and Mrs MacDonald.

—It was Rev R. H. Stavart, Harcourt, who was referred to yesterday as visiting in Moncton. The name was incorrectly given in The Guardian.

—Happyland, Summerside, has a big program of all new pictures for tonight. The principal picture is that of an Indian story entitled "A Young Deer's Bravery," besides three other comic pictures; also a new illustrated song by Mrs Powell. "If You Have No One's Sweetheart."

—Dealers in Summerside yesterday were paying 18 to 22 cents a lb for butter; 43 cents a bus for white oats, 44 cents a bus for black oats; 10 to 10 1/2 cents a lb for pork; 9 cents a lb for hides; 18 cents a doz for eggs; \$10 to \$10.50 a ton for hay, and 12 to 13 cents a lb for chickens.

—W. S. Newsom, Summerside, shipped by the Empress yesterday to the N. B. market, 10 fine craft horses. Among the lot were some choice bred mares one of which was raised by James McDonald, North Bedouque, another by Adam Robertson, Victoria, the pair weighing 2500 lbs.

—The following are the Alberton market prices:—White oats, per bus, 41 to 42 cents; black oats, per bus, 42 cents; butter per lb, 19 to 20 cts; eggs, per doz, 17 cents; pork, per lb, 10 to 10 1/2 cents; hides per lb, 8 1/2 cents; hay, per ton, \$9; pressed, per ton, \$9 to \$10 and beef per quarter, 7 to 8 cents.

—Leo McNeill, the ten year old son of Joseph McNeill, Summerside, was run over by a passing team on Central Street on Monday evening and was rendered unconscious but was alright yesterday. The little fellow was playing on the sidewalk with some others and running out on the street came in contact with the team which came around the corner without his seeing it.
