Mrs. Kelly of this town has received

an announcement of the death of a near

relation. Rev. Robert McKay of Tor-

onto. The Mail and Empire in its issue

of the 2nd inst. publishes the following

in reference to the deceased.

One of the oldest clergymen of the

Presbyterian Church died yesterday,

when, at his residence, 39 Metcalfe

street, Rev. Robt. Dowie Mackay passed

away. The deceased was in his 92nd

year, being born in Thurso, Scotland,

in 1807, and educated at St. Andrew's

and Edinburgh. In the fifties he came

to Canada, where he had charge of the

Utica and Wellesley churches. He re-

retired from the active work of the mi-

nistry many years ago, and lived in re-

irement in the city. He was a nephew

of Sir William Campbell, Chief Justice

of Upper Canada in 1822, and his father

was Robert Mackay, historian of the

Mackay family. Mrs. Mackay prede-

ceased her husband two years ago.

There are five daughters living, Mrs.

Henry Carroll, with whom he lived;

Mrs. Thomas Carroll, of Fremont, Ne-

braska; Mrs. Grant, wife of Rev. J. A.

Grant, Presbyterian pastor at Richmond

Hill; Mrs. Greenwood Brown and

Mrs. David Carlyle, of the city. The

funeral will take place on Saturday, at

the Necropolis.
