Gone With The Wind At Capitol

OPENED LAST NIGHT AT THE CAPITOL THEATRE, 8'SIDE

The elaborate screen version of Margaret Mitchell's story "Gone With The Wind" opened at the Capitol Theatre, 8'side last night to a capacity house.

As a film achievement par excellence, the picture begins a precedent which it is unlikely will ever be surpassed. This was due to the desire of the directors to follow the text of the novel as faithfully as possible. Altogether, the movie has 188 scenes, and there are 2,017 words of dialogue. LACE AND NETS FOR SUMMER CURTAINS

A quite new and distinctly effective window treatment is the use of two sets of lace net curtains. A simple open mesh is used for the under curtains, which cover the entire window and are just self-length. Mesh of the same shade with a bold all-over design is hung in deep folds at each side of the window and hangs full to the floor. Using net for drapes and curtains is particularly suitable for summer, since the open meshes do not obstruct free passage of air.

At home the Government continued reorganization of the army command with the appointment of Major-General R. H. Haining as Vice Chief of the Imperial General Staff under General Sir John Dill.

Major-General B. C. T. Paget, commander of the 18th Division who commanded British troops in the campaign, was appointed Chief of the General Staff of the Home Forces with the temporary rank of Lieutenant-General.
