Appeals For Utmost Effort On Part Of C. N. R. Employees

MONCTON, Dec. 23—In a Christmas message to employees, J. P. Johnson, vice president and general manager, Atlantic Region, Canadian National Railways, called upon each to discharge his or her responsibility in the handling of the expected greatest volume of traffic that has ever been handled on the region at this season of the year in the same manner that members of the fighting forces are doing theirs.

"We are now approaching the time when the services of the Railway to the war effort and to the nation will be at its maximum requirement."

"The volume of traffic which must be handled between this time and the beginning of the New Year will be greater than it has ever been."

"Each and every man has a heavy responsibility. Let us discharge our responsibility like patriots. Let us be at our place of duty and let us discharge our duty just as our soldiers and sailors and airmen are discharging theirs."

"We may confidently expect that never again will we be called upon to do the sacred task which we are called upon to do between now and January 5, 1945. We may confidently expect that before another Christmas we shall have won the victory, and our soldiers will be again in our homes and our communities."

"If we give to our tasks the last full measure of our loyalty and of our devotion, we shall have the satisfaction of a job well done and it will be a credit to our efforts."

"I wish to all of you and to your family a very merry Christmas, and I hope that in the New Year you will find an abundance of happiness and good health."
