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PREMIER VOICES CONFIDENCE IN ROUSING ELECTION-EVE MESSAGE

Subsidy Claims Issue Not "Ancient History" Says Premier MacMillan

Government Leader Denounces Defeatist Liberal Attitude On Most Vital Campaign Issue And Scathingly Analyzes Liberal Anti-Health And Education Campaign. Conservative Candidates And Leader Warmly Applauded At Pownal.

13 KILLED IN PLANE CRASH

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MESOCCO, Switzerland, July 21.—Thirteen persons, including two prominent Britons, were dead today, victims of the crash of a Royal Dutch airline plane. While Swiss aviation experts investigated the disaster, which occurred yesterday, search went forward for a large shipment of money in the plane, which was missing. Lewis Nesbitt, a writer on Ethiopian questions, and Arthur Watts, humorist and artist, were the prominent Britons. Two women also were killed—Mrs. Gerald Phillips, and the plane's stewardess. The other victims were German and Dutch.

TEN YEARS FOR CHILD MURDER

PIETERSBURG, South Africa, July 18.—(C.P.)—Deserted by her husband and unable to get possession of her child a young mother killed the six-months-old daughter with an axe and was sent to prison for 10 years.

"We take our stand with the present Chief Justice of this Province who was our representative on the White Commission and who says that the claims of the Maritime Provinces have not been adequately dealt with, and we will continue to press for further realization of those claims," declared Premier MacMillan in a stirring speech Saturday night at Pownal. The meeting—the last in the campaign—was very largely attended and the best of order prevailed. The Premier, as well as the Conservative candidates, Messrs. MacDougald and Jenkins received a splendid hearing and a generous measure of applause. Mr. William McEachern, Mt. Albion, ably presided. "Our Liberal friends say the subsidy claims question is ancient history," continued the Premier. "We say it is very relevant to the present and the future. There are only two sources of revenue: one is from your own pockets, the other is by increasing our subsidy from Ottawa. We have fought for those claims on many occasions. A Conservative Government in 1912 obtained \$100,000 additional revenue on these claims; a Conservative Government in 1927 obtained \$125,000 by a further presentation; and a Conservative Government obtained a further subsidy increase of \$150,000 on those claims in 1931. \$375,000 additional annual subsidy in twenty-three years, obtained by Conservative Governments in this Province? Damning Indictment In External Audit

Putting up a straw man to knock down, the Liberal press complains the Conservatives wrongly charge the Lea Government with the full \$548,820 debt increase incurred in 1931. No such claim is made by the Conservatives. They assume full responsibility for their four months of that year.

The Patriot quotes the Public Accounts of 1930 and 1931, which show the full debt increase for the year. It does not quote the External Audit of Aug. 29, 1931, however, which shows Liberal liabilities that year to be \$514,000, as against Conservative liabilities of \$4,800. "Whom," asks the Liberal press, "are the public to believe?"

Rests Case On Govt. Record And Platform

To the Electors of Prince Edward Island: On the eve of the election contest I have pleasure in reporting a steady swing in public opinion in favor of the Conservative administration which has endeavored to guide the destinies of this Province during four years of unparalleled difficulties and world depression. The record of the Government, on every platform, has been defended vigorously against Opposition attacks which in the main concern irrelevant issues, raised for the purpose of distracting attention from the utter hopelessness of the Liberal platform, which holds out no prospects to the poor man, the laboring man, or the unemployed.

The Government members and supporters have answered the Liberal criticisms, but they have mainly been concerned with presenting the more important issues in relation to the present and future finances of this Province, and to the prospects, based on the Government's record, of obtaining further subsidy increase and further grants in aid of unemployment and relief projects.

Our opponents, on the other hand, have adopted a defeatist attitude toward this issue, and hold out only one promise of importance financially, namely, a balanced budget. They have refused to state how a budget, which they could not balance in so-called prosperous years, is to be balanced now in years of unprecedented world depression. If sincere, their platform means heavily increased taxation or starved public services. Otherwise, it means a juggling of the public accounts, transferring items of ordinary account into capital account, as they did during their last years, and producing worthless paper surpluses on ordinary account while plunging the Province still further in debt.

The Conservative Government recognizes the problems facing this Province financially, and its record is the surest guarantee that its promises will be fulfilled.

From reports received from every constituency, I am assured that this appeal, directed to the intelligence of the electorate and not to prejudice or partisan feeling, is gaining tremendous ground and that the Government, on this issue, has nothing to fear and everything to gain when the votes are polled on Tuesday.

OTTAWA DOOR SHUT IF LIBERALS ELECTED

The campaign meetings have closed without one word being elicited from the Liberal candidates as to how they purpose to "balance the budget"—the most vital plank in their platform.

They not only "balanced the budget" but had three fake surpluses in their last four years of power. AND THEY CAME OUT WITH A DEBT INCREASE OF \$1,177,000!

Mr. Lea, in announcing his skeleton platform, stated the Liberal policy would be to balance the budget "on ordinary account."

Mr. Thane Campbell, deputy Liberal leader, admitted in the campaign that a balanced budget "would not necessarily mean no increase in debt."

The MacMillan Government, having already obtained \$150,000 of annual subsidy increase, promises further efforts in this direction, based on the minority report of the White Commission which leaves open the door for claims presentation on the basis of the Province's fiscal need.

If the Liberals could really "balance the budget" we would have no ground for appealing to Ottawa on the basis of fiscal need. If elected, they could not apply to Ottawa because Ottawa would say: "Why do you come to us for money, when you assured the electors that you could balance the budget without any further revenue increase?"

Opposition Candidates Under Withering Fire At St. Charles Meeting

Hon. Dr. MacDonald With Messrs. J.H. MacDonald And Reid Underhay Show Up Silly Criticisms & Suppositions Of Opposition Speakers. School Inspectors Use Sleighs In Winter Therefore No Cars For Officials, Suggests Saville.

The inane prating and "peanut politics" of the Liberal candidates of P.E.I. were shown in their true light at St. Charles Saturday night, when Hon. Dr. A. A. MacDonald and Messrs. J. H. MacDonald and Reid Underhay subjected them to a withering blast of criticism.

Hon. Dr. MacDonald "called" Mr. George Saville's bluff regarding the balanced budget. Following the latter's verbose criticism of government financing, Dr. MacDonald remarked that apparently Mr. Saville had reformed in the last four years, and referred to the no small part that Liberal candidate had in piling up the Liberal debt of \$1,177,000. Dr. MacDonald in splendid form ripped to pieces Mr. Saville's speech, showing that little of it could be substantiated, and that it was the customary Liberal campaign speech, a conglomerate of suppositions, guesses and half-truths. Mr. J. Howard MacDonald gave a splendid outline of the record of the government. Mr. William Hughes' speech which dealt chiefly with the Falconwood plans was answered in one sentence by Mr. Reid Underhay. A hint of the success of that Liberal plank having to do with officials' motor cars was given by Mr. George Saville. He stated that officials did not require cars, and cited the case of school inspectors who drove around in winter in sleighs.

Mr. Leo Dolron capably acted as chairman.

NAILS SLANDEROUS MISSTATEMENT OF LIBERAL CANDIDATE

The following statement, credited to Mr. W. F. Allan Stewart, Liberal candidate, appears in the Patriot report, July 19, of the political meeting at Kelly's Cross:

"Mr. Wigmore had told the people of the north side of the Island that he would receive a very warm welcome when he got into Mr. Beaton's district. Mr. Wigmore did receive a warm welcome, said Mr. Stewart, he received a hot one, for one man upon whom he called, took an axe and told him to get out of his sight as soon as possible."

This statement is absolutely false, and I have written to Mr. Stewart, demanding a public retraction. In the meantime, I may say that my absence from the Kelly's Cross meeting was necessitated by the sudden illness of my daughter. This fact was stated at the meeting, and must of necessity have been known to Mr. Stewart.

I received neither personal criticism nor threat of violence from any elector, Liberal or Conservative, during my whole campaign.

Flyers Land At Cartwright
