..NOBLE RESCUE.—What almost proved to be a fatal drowning accident took place at Souris on August 12th last, while Mrs. Fred B. McIntyre of Hudson, Mass. and her little daughter were out bathing on the rocks at Souris Beach. The little girl who was playing around was noticed by her mother to climb out on a rock and slide off into deep water. The danger was also observed by Mr. Michael Cheverie, who was some distance away, and observing that the little one's mother had started to her rescue, she being in about ten feet of water, the Cheverie Bros., Mark and Michael, immediately launched a boat in time to save mother and child who were going down for the third and last time. At the time of the rescue a fierce wind was blowing off the land which made the work of rescue and getting to the shore most difficult. The little child was rescued was black in the face and the mother completely exhausted. The noble rescue by the young men should not be overlooked.—Com.
