**Supreme Court at Summerside**

The supreme court sitting at Summerside, His Lordship the Chief Justice presiding, was occupied all day yesterday with the case of the King versus John McKenna and Hugh McKenna. This was the first case to be called on the criminal docket, on an indictment for assault occasioning actual bodily harm. Attorney-General Saunders, K.C., and T. A. Campbell appeared for the Crown. C. D. McCullum for the prisoners. Mr. Campbell opened the case for the crown and outlined the story of the assault alleged to have been committed by the prisoners on William D. Glars, a prohibition officer, at Boston, on the 15th of October last. The following witnesses had been examined for the crown when the court rose shortly before six o'clock. Prohibition Officer Clark, upon whom the alleged assault was committed; Dr. E. A. Bell, who attended to the officer's injuries; Mrs. Margaret Fareley and Mrs. Margaret Campbell, eye witnesses; Court adjourned until 10:30 a. m. today when the case will be resumed and a number of further witnesses will be heard.



**THE LATE JOHN MACPHEE**

Citizens of all classes learned with regret yesterday of the death of one of our most prominent citizens, Mr. John MacPhee, who passed away at noon in the Charlottetown Hospital. Mr. MacPhee had been in failing health for some time, and about a month ago was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital. For some time strong hopes were entertained of his recovery, but about a week ago his illness took a serious turn, and he sank gradually until the end came.

The late Mr. MacPhee was born in 1852 at Bayfield, Lot 46, a son of Mr. Angus MacPhee and Arabella MacPhee. He received his early education in the school at Bayfield and began his business career as assistant in the establishment of the late Mr. Knight of Souris. For some 25 years of age he was employed by the late Mr. D. Brennan, a prominent merchant of the city. Later he entered the employ of the late Owen Connolly, after which he engaged in business for himself as a general merchant, under the firm name of John MacPhee & Co.
