SUGAR-COATED PHILOSOPHY.

A recent telegram from Milan published in our columns announced that the Pope had issued a condemnation of the philosophy of Henri Bergson, as sketched in his book on "Creative Evolution."

Without in any way discussing the merits or demerits of the controversy, Bergson having undertaken to reply to the Vatican, it may be admitted at once that Bergson's philosophy is seductive.

The great philosopher is young as philosophers go. He is but fifty-three, and until a few years ago was merely, so far as the world knew, a secondary school teacher in Paris.

One of his disciples says: "There is, perhaps, no philosophy which appears to the superficial reader more open and easy of access, and there is certainly none more baffling and difficult to grasp."

Another of his admirers thus illustrates the general aspect of the Bergsonian system: "On the whole," writes Mazel, "M. Bergson's philosophy belongs to the great movement of reaction against the philosophies of determinism, realism, and positivism which a quarter of a century ago reigned uncontested."
