Plans Expedition To Tropical Seas

(By The Canadian Press) HAMILTON, Bermuda, May 21—Bruce Fahnestock, American explorer-adventurer, who with his brother completed a two-and-a-half year cruise of tropical seas to return to the South Sea Islands with an expedition to record and study native music. But instead of the 65-foot yacht he plans a 20-man expedition with possibly an airplane, he told a Hamilton service club. The cruise of the Fahnestocks, Bruce and Sheridan and finally their mother, took them to Panama, the Galapagos Islands, the Marquesas, Tahiti, Samoa, North New Hebrides, Solomon, Torres Straits and the East Indies. Eventually they wound up in Peking where they were when the Sino-Japanese war broke out. It was while they were in Portugal's only East Indies colony, he said, that to impress local officials he wrote to President Roosevelt, addressing him as "Dear Frank" and congratulating him on his re-election. After that, officials greeted them warmly. Three months later, their mother wrote asking what was "this White House business" and enclosing a note written on White House stationery. The note said "Dear Fahnestocks: Ticked to death to hear from you. Do drop in and see me when you get home. Frank."

Peep Into Past Is Reward When Jar Is Opened

PICTOU, N. S., May 23—(CP)—A peep into the past rewarded interested Pictouans when a jar which had been placed under the cornerstone of Pictou Academy May 24, 1880, was opened by T. A. MacKay, chairman of the School Board. Following a fire last year which partially destroyed the famed school, where many distinguished Canadians were educated, the remaining walls were demolished in preparation for a new building. Workmen discovered the jar and its contents undamaged. The papers were damp and a musty smell clung to them but otherwise they were perfectly preserved. One rear almost unrecognizable, faded and it was impossible to trace their outline although the lettering on them was quite distinct. The jar, along with copies of The Morning Herald and The Morning Chronicle, The Eastern Chronicle and The Plain Dealer, Edinburgh, Scotland. The first three are still being published. There also were almanacs and clippings on British politics, including one of Gladstone succeeding Disraeli as Prime Minister. An illuminated parchment headed "The Scroll" signified that the ceremonies were laid by David Allison, superintendent of education for Nova Scotia. A signature at the bottom of the scroll is that of Charles E. Tanner, now Senator Tanner. Silver and copper coins were found in the jar along with number of papers giving statistics and information about the Pictou of that day. Among the statistics appeared what was a list of all the school children in Pictou at the time and there School Commissioner, J. Sim Anderson found his own signature with the age "7 years 3 months" opposite it. He has no recollection of signing the list. The documents will be dried carefully and replaced in the jar along with other records to be laid in the cornerstone of the new building. The fire was the second to strike the old Academy. In October, 1895, lightning fired the building and all but the walls burned down. The school then was rebuilt twice its original size.

Training Schools May Be Expanded

GLACE BAY, N. S., May 23—(CP)—Apprenticeship training centres similar to those now operating in Glace Bay, Sydney and North Sydney may be established in industrial communities all over Nova Scotia, Labor Minister L. D. Currie said during an inspection of the centres in Cape Breton. The three schools were established as experiments, Mr. Currie said, and reports from them were gratifying. Employers seemed pleased with the work of their students and numerous young men had been placed as soon as they were through their training. The North Sydney centre was opened in 1936, and the Glace Bay one last summer. The latter has had a continuous enrolment of about 70 pupils and a number of graduates have been placed with employers there. The Sydney training school was opened several months later.

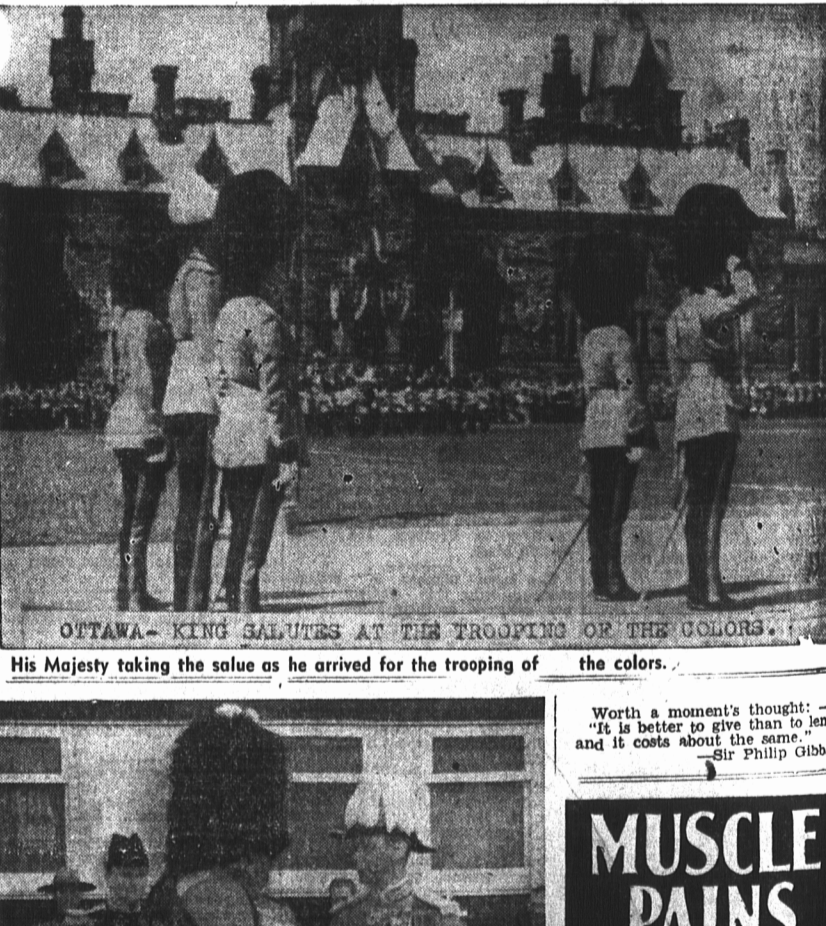
