**REV. MR. HARDY'S FUNERAL.**—Many ministers who had known the Rev. C. A. Hardy, and some who had studied with him, were mourners at his funeral which took place from the Presbyterian College this afternoon. Mr. Hardy was minister of the Presbyterian church of Rexton (N.B.), and died at the Royal Victoria Hospital here on Wednesday last, says a Montreal exchange. He was born about 43 years ago in Prince Edward Island and received his education at McGill, the Presbyterian College and also at Edinburgh. He was married to Miss Marion Florence Lee, daughter of the Rev. Archibald Lee, of Maxville, (Ont.), and sister of the Rev. H. S. Lee, of Fairmount Presbyterian Church, Montreal. Prof. D. J. Fraser officiated at the funeral in the absence of Rev. Principal Scrimger. The Rev. A. D. MacKenzie, of St. Luke's church, a former fellow-student of the deceased, read the scripture lesson. Rev. Dr. Manson, of Taylor church, offered the prayers. A brief address was given by Rev. E. E. Mowatt, college friend of the deceased and member of the same presbytery. Another address was given by Prof. Fraser referring to the career of the deceased, as a student and minister. The professor paid tribute to one whom he had known from boyhood. The faculty and students of the Presbyterian College were present, as well as the registrar of the university, college graduates, city clergymen and friends.

**DIED IN THE WEST.**—Many friends will regret to learn of the death in North Portal, Sask., of the Rev. J. Coffin of Savage Harbor, P. E. I. R. Coffin, which occurred there Tuesday, the 16th. The late Mr. Coffin was a son of the late Mr. Benjamin He graduated from Pine Hill College and was first stationed at Bloomfield on the Island, and afterwards at Durham, N. S. Some ten years ago he went West, where he has since labored in the ministry. His wife predeceased him some years ago, and was buried in Durham, where his body will be laid beside her on the 24th of this month. A family of three sons and two daughters are left to mourn their loss and cherish his memory. Mr. Henry S. Coffin of this city is a brother of the deceased.

**THE CAR FERRY.**—The following from the Montreal Standard of recent date, although somewhat astray as to the duration of Prince Edward Island's isolation—which is seldom prolonged beyond a few days—will be of interest to Island readers:—The Prince Edward Islanders are greatly interested in the establishment of the car ferry service by the Dominion Government between Cape Tormentine, N. B., and Carleton Point, P. E. I. at a cost of over \$2,000,000. This ferry service will mean that P. E. I. will be in constant touch with the rest of Canada throughout the year, whereas it is often isolated for months during the winter season, by reason of the present routes from Pictou and Point du Chene being closed. The car ferry will also reduce the time of crossing the straits from two hours and a half to a little over half an hour. It will mean freedom from sea-sickness for the passengers, and remove all dread and discomfort formerly attending a visit to the Island by reason of rough weather on the Straits.

The advent of the car ferry will bring many additional tourists to the Island, which has a high reputation as a summer resort. It is the intention of the Government to standardize the railway on the Island, which will permit the cars to be loaded and unloaded without change.

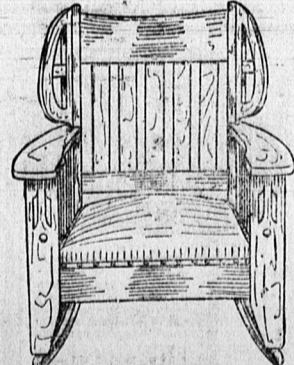
