AROUND THE FOX RANCHES

Dr. Livingston T. Mays, U. S. Consul, and Mrs. Mays, in the company of Mr. George DeBlois have been visiting some of the fox ranches round Charlottetown and have expressed themselves delighted with what they have seen.

The Royal Investment Company, Ltd., yesterday received application for shares from such distant centres as Providence, Baltimore, New York and Halifax.

A well-known citizen yesterday said he had such confidence in the present outlook that he would rather be in the market with fox shares than any other investment. He could guarantee that he would sell \$10,000 of fox shares sooner than \$100 of any other securities.

The Lampton Fox Company, recently organized, have placed ten pairs of cross foxes in their ranch on Union Road.

The ranch of the Canada Atlantic Fox Ranch is nearing completion and will be ready for the reception of the foxes within a week or ten days.

Mr. George N. Sergeant, book-keeper of the Massachusetts Fox Ranching Company, who has been attached to the Massachusetts Fox Exchange, Charlottetown, during the past summer, left yesterday morning on return to Boston. He took with him six pairs of very nice silver black foxes for a ranch in Massachusetts.

Mr. James E. Newsom, Secretary-Treasurer of the Massachusetts Fox Ranching Co., left yesterday for Boston after spending a few days in the city.

The Upton Fox Company are paying a cash dividend of ten per cent., with a promise of a further dividend in the near future.

Mr. Dodd Dwyer, of Pictou, N. S., who is prominently interested in a number of fox companies in this province, returned home yesterday, after a brief visit to Charlottetown.

Some of the directors of the Kingsbury Fur Farms, Limited, who are on the mainland recently visited this province where the company's ranch is located, for the purpose of inspecting the ranch, which has been built at Inkerman. The managing director of this company is Mr. B. Roy Holman of Charlottetown. The visitors were Dr. H. K. McDonald, (of Halifax), who is President of the company, Mr. J. D. Campbell (Secretary), Mr. John T. Fry, (Treasurer) and Dr. Rehms, of Bridgewater, N. S., who is one of the largest shareholders of the company. They were very satisfied as the result of their inspection of the company's ranch, expressing themselves as being particularly well pleased with the fox situation and its prospects. They also inspected other fox ranches on the Island and have gone away with a very enthusiastic opinion of the fox industry and the splendid future before it. The five pairs of foxes which the Kingsbury Company are working with have been already placed on the ranch. Dr. McDonald is one of the

leading surgeons in Nova Scotia, while Dr. Rehms has the reputation of enjoying the largest practice in southern Nova Scotia.
