Attention Farmers Needing Help for Harvest and Potato Digging

Under a new agreement between the Provincial and Federal Governments it is now possible for Prince Edward Island farmers in need of help for harvesting and potato digging to secure such help from the Army. The following facts should be noted, viz:—

- 1. The rate of pay to be \$3.00 per day, for every day the soldier-laborer works.
2. Farmer to provide food and lodgings for soldier-laborer during time of engagement.

3. Farmers do not have to sign for any definite period of time.
4. If soldier-laborer is unsatisfactory as a worker farmer may dismiss.
5. Farmer does not pay soldier-laborer for wet days on which the soldier-laborer does not work.

6. If in need of such labor you should write to the Farm Labor Bureau, Charlottetown at once requesting application forms be sent you.
