Admiral Grant did not give the date of the Crescent incident, but said it was since the trouble on Athabaskan. The latter vessel is in the Caribbean Sea on training manoeuvres with east and west coast squadrons.

He attributed the incidents to the fact that there was considerable switching of crews in order to give as many men as possible sea time. This made it difficult for the men to settle down.
