WORK has been commenced upon the Y connection from the northern extremity of Hillsboro' Bridge to the main line. The main line near the Fork Factory, and the outer extremity will join at the Lower St. Peter's Road crossing. At this point the city raised some protest at first—claiming that the line was on city land—but it was pointed out by the Recorder that the land was included in the Government expropriation.

THE appointment of Robert Rattray to the captaincy of the Hook and Ladder Co. which was made by the City Council on Monday night is a most popular one. Capt. Rattray is one of the veteran firemen of the city and has done much to uphold the prestige of the city and Province. He joined the company in 1880, was a member of the H. and L. team that ran a Mometon and won in 1891 also a member of the winning team here in 1892 and Captain of the victorious team in Halifax in 1902.

ST. PETER'S HARBOUR NOTES.—Farmers in this vicinity are about through cropping. Hay looks very promising and by all appearances a good crop may be expected.—Fishermen have had a successful season so far.—Lobsters are plentiful and of large and numerous.—Mrs. Lather Davison has sold her valuable farm to Albert Simpson of Hamilton.—Jas E. Moffatt has been visiting in this place the last few days. He was the guest of Mrs. R. W. Davison.—Robert Jay has returned to his home in Marie after visiting friends in this place.—A long felt want has been supplied the people of Bristol in the shape of a new boarding house which has been established at that place. The house which is under very skilful management accommodates both permanent and transient boarders.—Owing to the demands of the people of Bristol a hack is now running between Bristol and St. Peter's Harbor. This hack which carries passengers and freight has now made its third trip and expects to continue throughout the season.—The public think it is high time the roads in this vicinity were repaired as they are in an almost impassable condition.

WITH great sadness the death will be learned by many of George Gardiner Jury of this city, which occurred yesterday morning at six o'clock. The deceased who for the past twenty-six years had conducted a watch and jewelry business in the city was for the past two years in ill health and in March gave up his store. For some time afterwards he seemed to improve but on Wednesday he grew worse till the end came yesterday. He was a son of the late John Jury who was also a watchmaker, having conducted business in this city for many years. Mr. Jury was fifty-one years of age and was married in 1883 to Anna McKenzie by whom he had three children, Pearl, Russell and Horace. Besides these he leaves to mourn a brother John in Malden, Mass., who came home a fortnight ago, and who was obliged to return on Saturday, and also another in Minnesota, and Charles residing near Boston. His sisters are Mrs. Charles Park in California, Mrs. Kingham of Brackmount, Mrs. Hubbard of Lynn Mass, Mrs. John McLean, Souris, and Mrs. McNeill, Ottawa. Mr. Jury was a man of quiet, unassuming disposition and his death at a comparatively early age will be regretted by many friends. He was a member of Court Avondale, I. O. F., under the auspices of which society the funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock.
