Two brothers, James and David, Head of Hillsborough and one sister, Mrs. Henry McEwen, St. Peter's, survive. Deceased was a uncle of the late Dr. Douglas, formerly Speaker of the Legislature and of L. H. Douglas, M.P.

Extensive repairs are being made at the end of the Steam Navigation Co's Wharf. New piles are being driven and the foundations strengthened and repaired.

Owing to Friday having been declared a public holiday there will be no market on that day but it will be held instead on Saturday following. Next week Tuesday, May 24th, is also a public holiday and a market day. The market will be held on the Wednesday following in this case.

There was a fairly good attendance at the city market yesterday and produce although still somewhat lax was more plentiful than it has been yet this season. The only change in quotations was that of mutton, which sold at eight to eight and a half cents per pound by the carcases and nine to twelve cents a pound by the small in the retail market. Lamb steers sold at twelve cents a pound.

The Plant Liner Halifax arrived in port from Boston and Halifax yesterday morning, this being her first trip of the season to Charlottetown. She got in at 6 o'clock and the fog was so thick in the harbor that she kept her whistle going continuously until docked. The steamer had 75 passengers leaving Boston, twelve were for Hawkebury and only two, T. Webster and H. Pinyon for Charlottetown. The inward cargo was fairly large consisting mainly of fruit for various dealers. The steamer sailed at noon taking the first shipment of lobsters of the season for Boston and two passengers, Miss J. Reid and Edward Cullen.

\$1,000 TO WATCH FUNERAL.

LONDON, May 17.—The demand for windows and other points of vantage along the route of King Edward's funeral procession on May 20 is already immense. Many houses and shops have posted notices that all their windows have been sold.

Numbers of Americans are among the applicants. Ten Americans have paid \$1,000 for a small balcony, and this is not an exceptional price. One owner of a house in I recently has refused \$1,500 for a single window on the first story. A small window on a higher story sold for \$1,000.

In many cases the prices are double those charged on the occasion of Queen Victoria's funeral. Thirty shillings are being paid for standing room for one person on roofs.

King Edward's interest in the American's cup contests was well known, but the fact that he had a hand in designing Sir Thomas Lipton's yacht was not generally realized. Sir Thomas in a published eulogy says the King made many suggestions in connection with the designs which were calculated to improve his yacht's chances of success of winning the cup.

TWO MEN DROWNED
IN SALEM HARBOR.

SALEM, May 17.—Two men were drowned and the lives of three others imperilled when a dory was yesterday overturned off Winter Island in the deepest part of Salem Harbor.

THIRTY NEGROES DIED BY FIRE.

CENTREVILLE, Ala., May 17.—Thirty negro convicts lost their lives when the stockade of the Red Feather Oil Co. was destroyed by a fire on May 15. One of the prisoners in an effort to gain his freedom.

TWO MEN DROWNED.

HALIFAX, May 17.—The third fatal boating accident within a week, took place on this harbor when John Douglas and Bert Himmelman of Eastern Passage lost their lives while returning from McNab's Island in a sailboat. They were moving under full sail when the boat struck the breakwater and capsized.

DOUBLE DROWNING
IN A WHEELPOOL.

VANCOUVER, May 17.—Walking along a fifty foot cliff, Miss Tempest slipped over into the whirlpool of Capilano. Attracted by her screams her brother, Thomas Tempest, aged twenty-five, tried to rescue her, but both sank in the chilly glacial stream. Neither of the bodies has been recovered. Three hundred people witnessed the double drowning.
