### Three Burned To Death In Quebec Fire

ROXTON POND, Que., June 22 — (CP) Trapped by an early morning fire that spread rapidly through their two storey frame home, three elderly persons—two men and a woman—were burned to death here Saturday.

The victims were Origene Beauregard and his wife, both about 80, and Mrs. Beauregard's brother, Wilfred Fontaine, 64, of Sherbrooke, Que., who only recently came here with his wife to visit his sister and her husband.

Mrs. Fontaine, aged 59, escaped from the house but her arms and face was severely burned. She was taken to hospital at nearby Granby where her condition was described as serious but no longer critical.

The fire began about 3 a.m. and was well under way before neighbors saw the flames and notified the Granby Fire Department. The fire brigade could not save the Beauregard home but prevented other buildings in this Eastern Townships community from being destroyed.

### Memorial To Great Pitcher Unveiled

WASHINGTON, June 22 — (AP) — President Truman Saturday unveiled a memorial at Griffith Stadium to Walter Johnson, Washington Senators' great speedball pitcher, who died last fall.

The President's surprise visit to the park, where Johnson hung up many of his records that still stand in baseball, found only an estimated 5,000 to 6,000 fans on hand.

The memorial is a granite monument with a bronze tablet inscribed to the memory of the hurler, who won nickname of "The Big Train" because his fast ball often was compared with the speed of a steam engine.

**In Same Position**
